The program is open to any student, but is specifically in place to give students who are chronically missing work or in need of additional




homework time a place to go to catch up, get organized, and get extra help.

News from the Nurse — What is Stroke?

Stroke is a disease that affects the arteries leading to and within the brain. It is the number four cause of death and a leading cause of disability in the United States. Last year 795,000 people suffered a stroke in the U.S.


A stroke occurs when a blood vessel that carries oxygen and nutrients to the brain either bursts, ruptures, or is blocked by a clot. As a result, the brain cannot get the blood and oxygen it needs and pieces of the brain die.

Stroke Risk Factors

Approximately 80% of strokes can be prevented. Though some stroke risk factors are uncontrollable, such as age and race, other risk factors are in your control and making small lifestyle changes can reduce your stroke risk. For example, hypertension, which is the leading risk factor, can be controlled by eating a healthy diet, regularly engaging in physical activity, not smoking, and by taking prescribed medications. The American Heart Association identifies seven factors to control for ideal health. Life's Simple 7: be active, control cholesterol, eat a healthy diet, manage blood pressure, maintain a healthy weight, control blood sugar, and don't smoke.

Types of Stroke

⇒ An Ischemic Stroke occurs when a clot or mass, often a fatty plaque deposit, clogs a blood vessel cutting off the blood flow to brain cells. Ischemic strokes account for 87% of all stroke cases.



- ⇒ A <u>Hemorrhagic Stroke</u> results from a weakened vessel that ruptures and bleeds into the surrounding brain tissue. The blood accumulates and forms a bruise within the brain tissue, compressing brain cells and causing them to die.
- ⇒ A <u>TIA or Transient Ischemic Attack</u> produces strokelike symptoms. A TIA is caused by a clot; but unlike a stroke, the blockage is temporary and usually causes no permanent damage to the brain. TIAs are often called "mini-strokes." Approximately 15% of all strokes occur after a TIA. A TIA is a medical emergency!



Identifying Stroke

F.A.S.T. is an easy way to remember the sudden signs and symptoms of a stroke. F.A.S.T. is:

Face Drooping — Does one side of the face droop or is it numb? Ask the person to smile.

Arm Weakness — Is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

Speech Difficulty — Is speech slurred, are they unable to speak, or are they hard to understand? Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence, like "the sky is blue." Is the sentence repeated correctly?

T ime to call 911 — If the person shows any of these symptoms, even if the symptoms go away, call 9-1-1 and ensure they are transported to the hospital immediately by ambulance, the fastest way to get medical care.

Chess Club Prepares for Tournament

The Chess Club is preparing for their first tournament game on December 6 at Nekoosa, Wisconsin. In the meantime, some club members are getting experience



playing in nearby open tournaments. Lucas Radtke, a ninth grade student, played in the 2014 Waupaca County Open on November 1. Lucas, who is rated at 1250 by the United States Chess Federation, won first place in the Open Section. Congratulations, Lucas!

To be eligible to play in the open section, a

player had to be a USCF member and had to play all five rounds using the Swiss System. The Swiss System pairs like players against like players. For example, a player that won their first game would be paired against a player who also won their first game, and a player with two wins and a loss would face a player with the same win-loss record. One point is earned by the winner of a game, .5 points for a draw, or zero points for a loss. Control time clocks are used, and each player has 40 minutes to make their moves with a 5-second delay. Lucas won four games with one loss. He won first place outright, but in case of a tied win-loss record, the winner is determined by which player played the tougher competition based on their rating.

The Chess Club practices every Thursday after school in the art room and periodically will have open chess play for other students to come in and play and learn about chess. Mrs. Radtke and I are co-coaching this year's Shiocton chess team and are currently deciding which five p represent Shiocton in the Northeast Wiscons



team and are currently deciding which five players will represent Shiocton in the Northeast Wisconsin Chess Association (NEWCA) tournament games. Each team has five players ranking on five boards.

Our number one board player would play other teams' number one board player and our number two board player would play other teams' number two board player, etc. Lucas Radtke is our only rated player. Players are rated once they play in a tournament, and the rating is based on their competition and win/loss record. I played in my first USCF tournament November 8-9 — the Wisconsin Chess Association Veterans Tournament in Oshkosh — and entered as a non-rated player. My new rating will be based on the same criteria as the junior/ scholastic level.

Mural Work

The Art Club has been busy working on the Shiocton Public Library mural and is in the final stages of putting in second coats and detailing. Students who worked on the project this year are Nicole Pomeroy, Heather Hellweg, Alexis Zick, Hunter Herminath, Jaden Schneider, Morgan Knoke, Courtney Jansen, Zach Thede, and Rylee Davis.





Also at the Shiocton Public Library

On view now at the public library are two design projects from last spring's Art 2 classes. One is based on artist Debra Butterfield's horse sculptures, in which she designs horse forms using tree branches and twigs and translates these into bronze sculptures.

Students selected an animal or insect to translate into a stick form, thinking about the shapes and forms that make up the essence of the animal.

Also on display is a project in which students learned about the artist Henry Moore, an abstract sculptor who created bronze sculptures based on the human form. Students made sketches of classmates before selecting the drawing they wanted to create as a sculpture. They then simplified and merged shapes to create an abstraction from the drawing. The next step involved making a plasticine form based on the abstraction. Students then did a side and front view sketch onto a foam block of the plasticine form and carved from multiple sides. After carving the block, students colored the foam with a single color to accent the highlights and shadows on the form.

Art Club Trip

The club's trip to the Paine Art Center in Oshkosh to see a Henri Matisse print exhibition had to be canceled. Instead, the club went to the Milwaukee Art Museum to see the exhibition, "Of Heaven and Earth...500 Years of Italian Painting from Glasgow Museums." The exhibit

includes religious paintings from the middle ages to the late renaissance and secular neo-classical as well as genre paintings into the 19th century. Featured artists



include the Venetian artists — Tiziano Vecellio, also known as Titian (1487-1576), and the beautiful Venetian canal paintings of Francesco Guardi (1712-1793). The museum also features a fine permanent collection and the renovated architecture designed by international architect Santiago Calatrava.



Plans are being arranged for an Art Club sponsored bus trip to Madison during the second semester to visit the Capitol rotunda, the Chasen Art Museum, the Madison Center for Contemporary Arts, and the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus. This trip will be open to all high school students for a fee to help cover the cost of the bus. More details will be available in the near future.



Art 3 Students Work on Stained Glass Designs

Art 3 students are currently beginning a new project in stained glass. Students had previous experience with stained glass in both Art 1 and Art 2, with simple introductory projects that taught them how to translate designs onto glass and cut out simple glass shapes, use a glass grinder to clean up rough edges, apply copper foil tape to the edges of each glass piece, and stabilize the design so they could finish the process by soldering the glass together.





In this project, students needed to design or find a design that would be at least 12" by 18" and require up to 30-50 pieces of cut glass to complete. The project will take four to five weeks to complete, including either applying a lead cam border or creating a wood frame to hold the finished piece. The process involves:

- a) creating two copies of the design (one for cutting out to trace onto the desired glass),
- b) tracing and cutting all the pieces of glass,
- c) cleaning rough edges with the glass grinder,
- d) applying copper tape evenly, making sure that it adheres properly to the glass,
- e) nailing the design onto a board so it does not shift while soldering,
- f) applying flux and soldering to create a half round bead of solder,
- g) coloring and sealing the solder and creating the mounting frame.

Building Reading Skills in 5K

In December we will continue the theme of *Family Ties*, and then proceed with *Animal Families*. We will also be creating some holiday projects.

Kindergartners will continue to review the letters and letter sounds we have covered and will be introduced to the letters *Ll*, *Hh*, *Ee*, *Bb*, and the *ch* diagraph blend. We have started blending the letter sounds together to create and read words, using the letters we have already learned: *Tt*, *Rr*, *Ss*, *Mm*, *Pp*, *Cc*, *Aa*, *Nn*, *Dd*, *Gg*, *Ff*, *Ii*, and the *sh* and *th* diagraphs. Have your child practice making words by blending the letter sounds together.



At school the children will be using the sight words we have learned, plus our new words this month — gray, for, are, you, see, play, he, me, be, has, in, is, his, and that — to build sentences. Please continue to study the sight word cards with your child. We have also worked on blending letter sounds together (-am, -at, -ap), and we will continue with these and add -it, -ig, and -ip this month. We are working on developing the children's writing skills, too. Encourage your child to sound out words and write the sounds that they hear. They may surprise you!

In math this month we will be working on building teen numbers



using 5-groups, showing teen numbers as a group of ten ones and further ones, match partners and totals for teen numbers, tell and solve addition and subtraction stories, and show partners for numbers 2 through 7.

Parents, don't forget to help your child learn how to tie their shoes, as the teachers do not tie shoes after Christmas!

It is exciting to see the first graders "think like a scientist."

This brings us to December. We have lots of fun and exciting activities planned for this month. One favorite will surely be our gingerbread man unit. We will read several versions of this old tale and compare the stories. No gingerbread unit would be complete without the actual making and baking of



gingerbread man cookies! Even though we always tell the cooks not to peek at the cookies when they're baking, they always forget, and a few gingerbread men run away. We'll

have to be extra careful this year. \bigcirc

Our first graders are busy in music class preparing for their winter concert with Miss Ludtke. We hope you will be able to join us on December 19 at 1:30 p.m. in the high school gym to hear our students present their holiday musical gifts.

As we enter the hustle and bustle of the holiday season, sometimes the routines of homework get set aside. Remember that the more your first grader reads, the better reader he/she will become. Please try to keep your nightly routine of reading, practicing spelling, and completing math homework intact. Thank you for continuing to be an active participant in your child's education.

So Much to Do in Grade 2!

December brings the anticipation of snowy weather and holiday celebrations! To occupy the second graders until the BIG event, we plan to keep them very busy by continuing to work on reading and writing skills, math strategies, and so much more. The students are progressing in their ability to find common mistakes in writing in order to make sentences grammatically correct in conversation and writing. We continue to work on our reading skills by making connections, predicting, inferring, and retelling. All of these things help to build comprehension, so that we can take away all of the great parts of a story. There is so much more to a book than the words on the page! Don't forget to remind your second grader to choose a "Good Fit" book. These selections build a reader's confidence as well as allow readers to build fluency, accuracy, expression, and comprehension. Happy reading!

We worked on adding 2-digit numbers in math. We have learned about new groups below, show all totals, and new groups above strategies. We can also show a proof picture to prove our sum as well. We are connecting place values and money to these strategies throughout the unit. Now we can even add three or four 2-digit addends together! WOW, are we rocking out in math in second grade. Ask your child about how we are exploring length and shapes right now — estimating and using tools to measure, along with making line plots. Our math brains are overflowing with knowledge.



Lastly, we can officially say goodbye to warm temperatures. Please make sure that your child is dressed for the weather conditions on a daily basis. Wisconsin weather can be so unpredictable, so the best plan is to be prepared for each school day by sending all necessary items for cold weather as soon as they are needed. Each day, please provide your child with a warm coat, a cozy hat, and since the snow has already made its debut – a few pairs of gloves, warm boots, and snow pants. If you are unable to provide these items, please contact your child's teacher. Thanks for all of the help, guidance, and support that you provide to your child!

Children With Anxiety

Anyone from the youngest child to the oldest adult experiences anxiety and fears at one time or another. Many anxieties and fears are normal. Toddlers experience "separation anxiety" from caregivers. Kids ages 4-6 may have fears that are not based in reality, such as



monsters. Kids ages 7-12 may have fears that reflect real circumstances that may happen to them, such as bodily injury or natural disaster. Adolescents may experience anxiety of social acceptance or academic achievement.

<u>Signs of anxiety</u>: Clingy, impulsive, distracted, nervous movements (twitches), muscle tension, shaking, trouble sleeping, sweaty hands, accelerated breathing/heart rate, nausea, headaches, stomachaches.

What to do:

- Recognize that, from your child's perspective, these fears are real.
- Listen to your child and show them that you recognize their anxiety.
- Teach coping strategies, such as positive self-statements ("I will be OK," "I can do this").
- Practice relaxation techniques, such as visualization ("Imagine you are floating on a cloud or lying on a beach") or deep breathing ("Imagine your lungs are balloons and let them slowly deflate").
- If your child's fear seems out of proportion to the cause of stress, this may signal the need to seek outside help. Contact your doctor or mental health professional.


classroom bee sometime prior to December 17. The top two spellers from each classroom will move on to the local Spelling Bee.
