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Board Approves Retirements, Facility Study, and Increases

During the months of February and March, the School District of Shiocton Board of Education took action on six retirement requests.

Long-time educators, Mr. Tim Huebner and Mrs. Deb Scott, will both be retiring at the end of the current school year having served the youth of our community for 34 years. Mr. Huebner noted that, in addition to the continued professional development he participated in to enhance his instruction, he is proud of the many improvements and opportunities made possible for teachers and students through funds raised from the Middle School Paper Drive. Over \$43,000 was raised during the decade in which Mr. Huebner oversaw the recycling program. Mrs. Scott recalled knowing that she had "finally found the school district (she) would call home" when she was hired to teach ECH at the beginning of the 1988-1999 school year. One of the best perks of being a teacher in Shiocton was the ability to watch her own children as they grew, learned, and participated in the many offerings available in Shiocton schools. Mrs. Christine Anderson, choir teacher, will also retire in June after 19 years with the district. Mrs. Anderson expressed a deep regard for her time here, noting that the "Shiocton School District will always have a special place in my heart". She expressed an appreciation for the support and trust afforded her over the years as she grew both the choir offerings, as well as the vocal talents of her many students.

In addition to these educators, two long-time paraprofessionals, Mrs. Joyce Baggott and Mrs. Lori Ritchie, will be retiring at the end of the school year after 24 years of service to our learners. Mrs. Ritchie, long standing aid in the LMC, thanked the staff, students, teachers, administration, and Board for the many years of support, noting "it has been my great

honor to be able to serve the Shiocton School District". Mrs. Baggott, a "Jill of all trades", has served in a multitude of roles at various grade levels. In addition to supporting learners in the classroom, Joyce has provided supervision for them during recess and while transporting our youngest learners to and from school in the vans. Mrs. Baggott, ever present with a smile, noted that she has enjoyed working in the district all these years. Additionally, Mrs. Sue Cismoski, middle school paraprofessional, will be retiring in June after six years with the district. Mrs. Cismoski brought many strategies, ideas, and resources when she joined us after serving as a paraprofessional in a neighboring district. She, as well as a few of the other retirees, have expressed an interest in serving as a substitute in the coming year.

The Board also approved the issuance of a **Facility Study Request for Proposal**. The RFP seeks proposals from firms with experience in educational issues and facility planning. From the proposals received, the Board expects to select one firm who will conduct a full audit of the district building, studying both current and future needs, and then provide a priority matrix regarding potential upgrades, remodeling, and/or building to meet those needs. "While our budget for next year, as set forth in the three-year referendum, does not afford the opportunity to reach the CPI rate of 4.7%, I believe we have done well by all of our staff members with the total salary and wage compensation that the Board approved for next year," noted Mrs. Schweitzer, District Administrator.

FIRST GRADE

It may seem as though spring will never come, but here in first grade, we're hoping for the best! In the next few months, we will be reading and writing about spring. We'll be keeping our fingers crossed that it will help bring sunshine and warm weather back to our area. Speaking of reading, please keep up that nightly routine of reading with your child. It's one of the most important stepping stones to a successful school year.

In math this last quarter, we'll be concentrating on the following units: time, fractions, 2D and 3D shapes, graphing, and solving additional and subtraction facts where there is an unknown partner (13+ =18). Here are a few ideas to help your child connect math to the real world: Time—Telling time to the hour and half hour on both analog and digital clocks. Fractions—when making/cutting sandwiches or fruit, etc. ask your child to cut the food in half or fourths. Give your child 8 slices of an apple. Ask him/her to divide the slices in half (2 groups), or give you a fourth of the slices (2 slices). Shapes—play "I Spy" with common objects around the room. For example, say "I spy a circle" (clock), "I spy a cylinder" (can of soup), "I spy a rectangular prism" (shoe box). Graphing—have your child take a poll of family members about which vegetable to have for dinner or which movie to watch at night. Have them tally the results and ask them to report them to you. You can always ask them other questions like, "How many more people wanted peas than broccoli," or "Which movie choice was liked the least?" Unknown Partner Equations—present everyday type problems: when shopping, tell your child you need 9 cans of soup, but you already have 4 cans at home, so how many should you buy right now? When cutting fruit, tell your child you had 10 slices of an apple, but now there are only 3, so how many did I eat? By involving your child in these everyday type situations, he/she will see how important math is in our lives and how we use it in the real world.

It's hard to believe that we're heading into our 4th quarter already. The students have come a long way. We're so proud of them! Give your child a hug and express how you feel, too.

VIETNAM VETERANS VISIT SHIOCTON HIGH SCHOOL

Shiocton High School's U.S. History students recently had the privilege of meeting and hearing first-hand accounts about the Vietnam War from




some of the soldiers who served in it. Students were visited by Mr. Bob Dieck and Mr. Bill Blom, both of Shiocton. Each man spoke of being drafted, his time in the service, and the many experiences that make his story unique.

Each veteran began by sharing a bit about his training and role during the war. Blom was drafted

into the Army infantry and eventually ended up driving a tank with a flamethrower while Dieck, also drafted into the Army, worked as a cook. As the men spoke, it was clear they each had their own story but that some of their experiences seemed to be universal among all those who served in Vietnam. Among those common elements were heat, humidity, insects, and rodents that plagued soldiers as they clashed with an elusive enemy who put their lives in constant danger.

Dieck worked as a cook who was responsible for preparing meals for soldiers on base and delivering hot meals to those fighting in the surrounding areas as often as possible. With few "creature comforts" available to sol-

diers, a hot meal was certainly valued; however, as Dieck noted, sometimes cooks had few options to work with but did their best to ensure the food was as good as possible. Through his responses to student questions, it was clear working on a base did not necessarily guarantee security. Dieck spoke of constant concern about the local population, some of whom worked on the base, as



no one knew who was actually friendly to the Americans and who was a potential foe. Rocket attacks and booby traps posed continuous threats.

Blom operated a flamethrower on a tank and spent much of his time in remote areas. As he told students, "I don't camp. I had enough sleeping on the ground under the stars in Vietnam." In response to a student ques-



tion, Blom spoke about his arrival in Vietnam indicating their plane landed at night and all they could see as they approached were tracers and flares lighting up the sky. "Scary, scary, scary," he said wondering, "What were we getting into?" Blom was also part of the initial force to enter Cambodia, where he was wounded by shrapnel, an event that resulted in his Purple Heart. He also helped students understand more about the daily struggles of soldiers by describing snakes, insects, and jungle rot, which caused constant problems.

Both men spoke honestly to students about returning home, where they, like so many other veterans of this war, did not receive a proper welcome. Dieck noted, "You're kind of jumpy and have nightmares...takes a while to get back to normal." Blom added that he is still startled by unexpected loud noises as well, showing how the war did not completely end for soldiers just because they were back in the United States.

These veterans certainly provided an authentic learning opportunity for students, helping to make the information students have studied in class more real. "Students really appreciate the veterans' willingness to answer questions and share their personal stories," said teacher Elizabeth Schneider. "We are very lucky to have veterans in our community who are willing to help young people understand history and appreciate those who have served our country."
