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Spring Sports Preview: A Look Into This Year’s Teams, Expectations

Student Reporter, Gage Relien, takes an in-depth look at this year’s high school spring athletic teams and the expectations for the season.

Golf

The Shiocton Golf team is ready to make tee-off on a successful season under returning Head Coach, Dan Chandler. The Chiefs are looking to build off the momentum from last season. “We’ve got three guys returning and each one did have a meet where they scored in the top twenty, and we would like to continue that”.

Coach Chandler has confidence in his three guys. Junior Zach Flannery, the X-factor, Junior Logan Leeman, the diamond in the rough, and Sophomore Tristan Mueller, who is making the biggest leap. The golf team is hoping to recruit a fourth member, which would allow them to earn a team score, as well as individual scores. . “Based upon last year, (they could have a team score) in a top fifteen score at each of the events. We would like to finish in the top five for at least one team event”, said Coach Chandler on his expectations this year. With an experienced core of returning starters, the Chiefs are ready to hit the green.

Baseball

Heading into a year where the Shiocton Chiefs baseball team will host sectionals, the team is excited to capitalize on the opportunity with a veteran lead team. Following an annual trip to Illinois to

play a few games at the beginning of the year, the Chiefs are ready to get the bats cracking.

Returning for his 11th year, Head Coach Jude Backman felt the trip to Illinois was beneficial to the players, noting that the trip takes them to Illinois (Bushnell and Princeville) where the team can actually play games due to the usually favorable spring-time weather there. He also noted that the trip is “a good team bonding experience” that allows the players to interact with each other off the diamond for activities such as bowling and taking in a movie.

Assistant Coach Ben Prodel commented, “Knowing our Wisconsin weather, the Illinois trip is... usually spring training, first games of the year.” Coach Prodel also noted the importance of the trip in that the team is able to compete against players they do not usually see in a season. “Playing teams from different states gives us a different look with different coaching staffs; a way to gauge our players”.

Assistant Coach Ben Taylor, originally from that area in Illinois, was also on the trip. “We play Princeville every year; it’s our 6th or 7th year playing them to get into the baseball groove. It’s just not good enough weather to play here yet.” Coach Taylor also noted the benefit to the Chiefs in getting to play some different teams.

EXPECTATIONS

The coaches are excited about what the seniors will bring to the team this year, but also know that a lot of the team’s success rides on them. “Expectations for seniors are way up there. I’ve been coaching them since 6th grade. They love

the game, which makes my coaching so much easier. Hoping all four can have an outstanding year,” said Coach Backman. He believes the ‘22-’23 team is one of the deepest teams he has coached. “We’re solid Numbers 1 through 9, offensively and defensively. Not really a weak link.”

“I think we’ve got four seniors who we’re going to rely on,” commented Coach Taylor. He believes the seniors are some of the team’s best players given that they have experienced success in years past. Coach Taylor is confident that the seniors can lead the team.

The coaching staff commented on their biggest X-factors this year with Coach Taylor noting it would be the four seniors: Dawson (Schmidt), Bennet (Wilcox), and the Ebbens (Logan and Braxton). “Guys that have been starting since freshman year, that experience will pay off this year; big payoff”. Coach Prodel keyed in on the pitching X-factor. “Pitching is going to lead the way; it will come down to our pitching.” Coach Backman agreed on both the pitching and seniors. 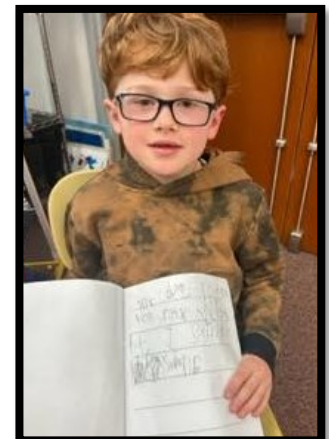

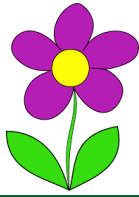
Seeking IT and Technology Volunteers
