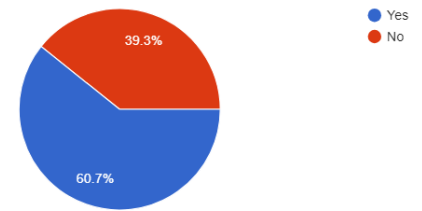

### Referendum Feedback Survey: Results Are In

By April 11, over 320 district voters had responded to the referendum survey either online or through the return of the printed copy. The results of the survey were reviewed at an open meeting on Monday, April 15, 2024. Attendees were also able to share additional thoughts and suggestions as each survey question was reviewed.

#### Needs Remain, Separate Mailing

A strong percentage of respondents indicated that they would support the District's pursuit of a building referendum in order to address the needs that still remain despite the outcome of the February election.

During the first portion of the event the students and a teacher from the technical college worked with the students from Shiocton to manufacture a chair. 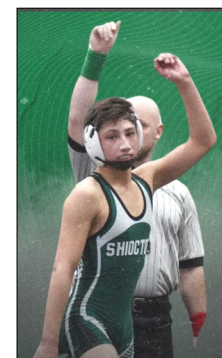

## NIL: WI HS Athletes on Verge of Getting Paid

With NIL potentially coming to Wisconsin high school athletics, we dive into what NIL is, the shadiness it brings, and what Shiocton coaches think about NIL potentially coming to Wisconsin high school athletics.

### Background

NIL - Name, Image, and Likeness - allows for student-athletes to profit off of their popularity, following, and athletic skills. For example, if college football players sign up to be in the new NCAA 25 video game, they will receive \$600 and a copy of the game. This counts as NIL. In July of 2021, the Supreme Court legalized the use of NIL in collegiate athletics. On August 31, 2021, California became the first state to legalize NIL in high school athletics. Since then, 30 states have followed suit by legalizing NIL in high school. While Wisconsin has yet to put any law in place for high school regarding NIL, the topic has been discussed by WIAA for the past three years. Per Executive Director, Stephanie Hauser, speaking to WXOW on April 18, "We have finally got to the point

where the scale has tipped where the majority of athletic directors would like to carry on that (NIL) conversation." All 518 WIAA member schools are invited to cast their vote on this topic at the Annual Meeting to be held on April 24.



### What Constitutes as NIL

This is where NIL compensation becomes tricky. Each state has their own NIL legislation, as well as each collegiate conference. Though, there are no federal NIL laws in place. This allows many teams and players to find loopholes in the current guidelines. A perfect example of teams and players finding the loopholes are the recruitments of Tennessee quarterback Nico Iamaleava and Arizona State quarterback Jaden Rashada. Both players resided in California, a state where NIL in high school is legal. This allowed both to get lawyers and be able to work out NIL deals with their respective schools. Iamaleava would go to Tennessee, but Rashada's recruitment was different.

Rashada originally committed to the University of Miami, but would decommit after a few months and commit to Florida. Florida NIL collectives offered him around \$13 million in NIL. The deal fell through, so Rashda would end up at ASU, respectively. The NCAA would investigate Florida and Tennessee to see what really happened behind the scenes. During this investigation, the State of Tennessee as well as Virginia would sue the NCAA for violating federal antitrust laws. Without becoming too confusing, Tennessee and Virginia would win the case, with the NCAA losing its ability to enforce NIL policy. With this, the NCAA suspended its investigations into the recruitments of Rashda and Iamaleava. As of right now, Rashada and Iamaleava did nothing wrong, they simply exploited weak guidelines.

This all leads back to NIL in high school. Technically, you are not allowed to talk with third parties about NIL in high school, though as you can see, this will not stop. College teams have been giving money to recruits under the table for years, now it's just legal. The question is, then, could a high school team technically give "NIL" money to a high school player from a different school to get them to play for them?

### **Coaches' Perspectives**

What do the coaches think about NIL potentially on its way to Wisconsin high schools?

#### **For**

Head Coach of the Shiocton Softball team, Dawn Kanaman, is in favor of NIL at the high school level. She mentioned that it's a great way for athletes to get a share of the money they help generate. "I think it would be great, but only if the money is used towards further education. It could potentially increase participation, which is declining by junior year."

For the guidelines and rules she would put in place are as follows:

- GPA guidelines must be established and

maintained

- Cap off the maximum amount each player is allowed to earn
- Any code violations disqualifies athletes from NIL earnings.
- All divisions must award equal amounts to deter athletes from opting out of smaller districts to larger districts

"It could help bring more athletes to smaller districts if the funds were equally available. It gives the same opportunities to boys and girls."

#### **Against**

Ben Taylor, who played football collegiately and coaches football and baseball in high school, is against the idea of NIL in high school. "I'm completely against it. I can understand some aspects at the college level, but overall though, I have a problem with it. Already seeing what is leading too, at college level with free agency, top recruits are looking for the biggest deals. It's taking away from the idea of a student athlete. I see major issues with high school athletes looking for the biggest deal, what district to transfer to. Adding money to the equation adds a whole another dynamic." If it were to pass, the rules Coach Taylor would put in place: (a) a very strong transfer rule and (b) a cap on the amount of money a player can earn. To be clear, Coach Taylor reiterated that he would never vote to pass it in the first place.

Chad Schmidt, the Head Coach of the boys basketball team, is also against the idea of NIL in high school. "I'm all for it at the college level; I'm just not sure at the high school level it can be governed well. It's so tricky. My point is, why at the high school level? What's truly beneficial for it? There's too many unknowns; it's hard to comment officially without feeling apprehensive at potential problems. It's so hard to govern. Lots of legal stuff behind closed doors."

What rules would Coach Schmidt put in place for the high school level? "I just wouldn't do it. Lets keep the amateur status. College is turning more into a business. Think the schools that have the best facilities and more resources will get the

best kids, top heavy talent. Top programs staying top programs. Some of the parody goes away." At what the future impact NIL in high school would hold. "Less sneakiness. Relaxed transfer rules. Get an offer to play for a school. This already happens working through AAU coaches, shoe companies. If Marquette and an AAU program have Nike Flights, there'll be lots of boosters, and the kid goes to Marquette. It's been happening for a long time. As a senior, you can start making money in high school." An example of this is Wisconsin Lutheran star basketball player Kon Knueppel, who is committed to Duke. If NIL was effective in Wisconsin high schools this year, he could be making money this season through Duke's NIL collectives. "It's kind of crazy how amateur status is here for so long and puff, it's gone. Going to have a lot of impact."

### **Wrapping It Up**

The idea of getting paid for your athletic abilities and the following you generate through your name, image, and likeness could be of great financial benefit, but it's extremely hard to govern - how do you ensure deals aren't being done under the table. And who is going to help the high school student athlete work through the NIL contracts so that s/he isn't overcommitted (and under-compensated)? Some coaches are all for it, while many are against the idea.

So, should NIL be allowed in Wisconsin high school athletics?

## SkillsUSA Travels to Madison

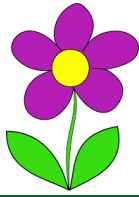
