# **Board of Education Sets Levy**

Voucher programs greatly impact mill rate

At their evening meeting on October 21, the School District of Shiocton School Board of Education set the tax levy for the 2024-2025 school year. The tax levy was set at \$4,554,521, with a resulting mill rate of \$8.50, which includes \$0.45 to cover the costs of sending students to private schools.

#### **Equalized Valuation Growth**

Overall, the Equalized Valuation of all property attributable to the district rose 5.3% over last year.

# News from the 7 - 12 Grade Office

This is Nick Ortlieb, the Principal in the 7th-12th grade office. I am happy to be able to inform our community about the great things happening here in the Shiocton MS/HS Office. We have had a great start to the year. Our students have transitioned into the school year very well, and we have settled in nicely to our daily learning routine. We celebrated Homecoming at the beginning of October, which was a highlight on a great start to the school year.

We have a few school goals that we are working on for the 2024-2025 school year. First, we are looking to grow our students' skills in the area of reading comprehension at the high school level. Our students will participate in silent reading each day to start the day and during their ELT/Homeroom periods. We will also be introducing our high school students to interdisciplinary literacy opportunities throughout all of their classes. Please continue encouraging your students to read 30 minutes a day at least 4 times a week. The more they read, the better. We are also continuing to prepare our students for the Forward test, Pre-ACT and ACT. # Board Sets Levy (Continued from Page 1)

. "This year's increase is more in line with the typical annual increase that what we have seen in past years," commented Mrs. Schweitzer, District Administrator. Due to reassessments, especially those in the Town of Boniva and the Town of Ellington the past two years, the equalized valuation throughout the nine (9) municipalities that comprise the School District of Shiocton rose a staggering 18% in 2022-2023 and an additional 13% in 2023-2024. "While growth in equalized valuation is desired, we are pleased to see the growth return to a more "normal" level than the large percentages of the past two years," stated Schweitzer.

#### **Taxpayers paying more for Private Schools**

The Wisconsin Parental Choice Program (WPCP) affords eligible students in Grades 4K - 12 the ability to attend a private school anywhere in the State of Wisconsin using local taxpayer dollars. The Special Needs Scholarship Program (SNSP) affords eligible children with special needs additional taxpayer dollars to attend a private school anywhere in the State of Wisconsin. Together, the WPCP and SNSP are commonly referred to as the Voucher Program. Together, the programs are costing the taxpayers \$245,680.00.

### There has been a steep and significant increase in the cost of both programs as illustrated by the graph. Over the past six years, the **WPCP has increased over 1000%,** from \$16,100 (2019) to nearly \$192,000 this year, while the **SNSP has increased over 300%,** from \$13,000 to nearly \$54,000.

#### Tax the Taxpayer


In accordance with Wisconsin State Statute 118.60, the Department of Public Instruction shall directly decrease a school district's state aid payment by the amount calculated for eligible students to attend a private school through the WPCP.

This amount shall then be passed along to the taxpayers as part of the resident school district's annual levy. For the 2024-2025 school year, the combined voucher program total of \$245,680.00 equates to \$0.45 of the \$8.50 mill rate.

Without the cost of the taxpayerfunded private school voucher program, the mill rate this school year that supports the public schools operated by the School District of Shiocton would have only been \$8.05.

# FUND 10 LEVY

The proposed Fund 10 Tax Levy of \$4,238,221 is the maximum levy allowed based upon the revenue cap limitations.

\$4,238,221/\$535,899,114 = 0.00790862 or \$7.91 per thousand of equalized value

#### **PFUND 39 LEVY**

We will be levying \$241,800 to cover the cost of debt service for the referendum approved debt (\$2,000,000 10-year bond). The Fund 39 Levy is outside the revenue cap calculation.

241,800/535,899,114 = 0.00045120 or 0.45 per thousand of equalized value

#### FUND 80 LEVY

We will be levying \$74,500 to cover the assigned costs for flag football, the multi-purpose facility and the child care center. The Fund 80 Levy is outside the revenue cap calculation.

74,500/\$535,899,114 = 0.00013902 or 0.14 per thousand of equalized value

#### Motion approved at School Board meeting October 21, 2024:

Motion: To levy upon the taxable property of the School District of Shiocton the sum of \$4,238,221 for defraying the cost of operation and maintenance of the public schools, \$241,800 for referendum approved debt, and \$74,500 for the community service fund for a total levy of \$4,554,521 and a mill rate of \$8.50 per thousand dollar of equalized value.

# Working hard and having a blast in Fourth Grade

Our classes have been building community through morning meetings. Students have also been challenging themselves with new learning in all subject areas. In math, students have recently learned how to multiply multi-digit numbers. They have



written realistic fiction stories using details about setting and characters, along with action, dialogue, thoughts, and feelings. Reading class has been filled with fiction stories and learning about how to determine the theme of a story, summarizing, talking about character traits, and more.

We have also made time for some fun celebrations. Students cheered on our Shiocton Chiefs football team at the homecoming parade, had a "book tasting" to learn about fiction genres, and played a game of "trashketball" to review math skills. We look forward to more fun learning this winter!

#### **Grade 2 Learning Math and Reading Strategies**

Despite the unseasonably warm temperatures, we know that the weather can change frequently. Please make sure that your child has the clothing necessary for enjoying the outdoors, especially as the cooler temps arrive. Let us know if you are in need of any warm weather clothing.

In math, second grade students are exploring two-digit addition strategies; there are so many to choose from. We encourage the students to try all of them to see which one or two strategies is the best fit for the way their brain thinks. Use the parent letters that come home with your child to assist you in understanding the current strategy or use the math glossary that was sent home earlier this year. Older siblings can also be a great resource. Please let your child's teacher know if your child is struggling, and we will support them here. No need for stressful homework sessions.

Counting coins will also be part of this month's math exploration. Identifying each of the coins and their value are skills we will be working on. We challenge you, while waiting in the car or restaurant, to provide opportunities for them to practice these skills.



Our reading focus for this month is to support the readers in thinking more deeply about the characters in the books that we are reading within class, as well as at home. The characters can respond to things the same way we might or very different from us. Stopping to think deeply provides readers with the opportunity to reflect on the character's action and why s/he might have taken that action. Students can also internalize the action they might have taken, be that the same or different than the character's action. We work on thinking beyond the book as well. How can we connect with the characters and to how they feel. We will begin exploring series books as we near the end of November. Getting to know the characters more deeply across different books is a new adventure for many 2nd grade readers.

Continue to encourage your child to read 15-20 minutes nightly whenever possible.
