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RETURN TO SCHOOL PLAN FOR THE 2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR

Per the CDC on July 9, 2021, vaccination is the leading prevention strategy to end the COVID-19 pandemic. People age 12 and older are encouraged to become fully vaccinated prior to the start of the school year. Persons seeking a vaccination for themselves or another are encouraged to reach out to their medical professional or visit https://www.vaccines.gov/ to find a vaccination location near you.

General Operations:

- Ill children stay home from school until 24 hours fever free.
 - o Parents are responsible to monitor their child(ren) each morning: do not send ill children to school
- Symptomatic close contacts will be quarantined for 10 days
 - Contact the school nurse (x714) before returning on Day 11
 - Symptomatic individuals in health offices should mask while parents are contacted for pickup
- Asymptomatic close contacts will not need to quarantine from school unless in the same household (exception: if close contact is vaccinated).
 - O Quarantine time: positive case 10 days; close contact 7 days w/negative test result.
 - The District will continue to contact trace and inform parents or guardians of close contact status.
- Maintain student-only entry into building at 7:40AM each morning
 - o Parents and visitors who have business in the school must report to the school office
- Masks are optional on school property and school sponsored transportation
 - Parents and students will make the choice on wearing face coverings
 - Students will sit in assigned seats (max three to a seat)
 - o Pick-up and drop-off on Park Avenue and at Lake Park will resume
- Allow field trips, including those with overnight and out-of-state/country travel, in keeping with practices used prior to COVID-19 and Board Policies
 - Volunteer chaperones may be allowed; teachers should discuss with building principal and school nurse aforehand
- Volunteers and speakers directly related to instructional lessons and learning activities may be allowed; teachers should discuss with building principal and school nurse aforehand
 - Access to the building by parents and visitors not related to instruction will remain restricted; parents and visitors with school business must report to the school office
- Continue to follow all WIAA rules
- Provide continued decision making for the District Administrator to institute additional mitigation strategies in the case of school transmissions

Operational Management:

- Water bubbler stations will reopen
 - o Parents are encouraged to continue sending a water bottle to school with their child
- Ensure hand washing and cleaning practices remain for and in all classrooms

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- Wipe down shared surfaces prior to lunch and prior to leaving for the day
- Assigned seating for contact tracing notification: classrooms, learning environments, and lunch room.
 - Seating charts will still be used for notifications on close contacts after contact
- Continue virtual instructional option for students during 2021-2022. Families must commit to virtual instruction for a semester.
 - Synchronous learning by way of ZOOM or similar medium will be used for students experiencing short-term absences related to COVID; attendance is required.
- Remove capacity limits for indoor events
- Host in-person Open House on Wednesday, August 25, 2021 from 4:30 6:00PM
- Additional operations at building level will be communicated to parents by building principals. (EX: conferences, synchronous learning schedules, etc.)

Supporting Data/Guidance:

- May through June attendance data shows marked decrease in absences related to COVID-19
 - No absences related to COVID-19 were experienced during summer school when situational masking was implemented without cohorting nor seating chart at meal time
- Outagamie County has decreased to a 'moderate' risk category on the DHS metric.
- There is no mask mandate at the state or county level.
- Most businesses are making masking optional.
- Outagamie County and the District boundaries per DHS continue to see a 7-day average decline in cases with minimal case counts over the last several weeks (1-3) per day. Wisconsin DHS website
- Children between 1-18 years of age have lower rates of hospitalization, severe hospitalization and deaths than do other age groups. American Academy of Pediatrics-COVID-19 Guidance for Safe Schools
 - Severe/critical illness and death are rare and occur most commonly in children with underlying health conditions.
- CDC recommendation for fully vaccinated individuals: resume activities without wearing a mask
- SARS-CoV-2 appears to act differently in children and adolescents than other common respiratory viruses such as influenza. *American Academy of Pediatrics-COVID-19 Guidance for Safe Schools*
- Children and adolescents play a major role in amplifying influenza outbreaks, to date, this does not appear to be the case with SARS-CoV-2. American Academy of Pediatrics-COVID-19 Guidance for Safe Schools
- Evidence indicates that children and adolescents can become infected and are less likely to be symptomatic and less likely to have severe disease results from SARS-CoV-2. American Academy of Pediatrics-COVID-19 Guidance for Safe Schools
- COVID-19 procedures are intended to mitigate, not eliminate, risk.
 - o Implementation of several coordinated interventions can greatly reduce that risk.
