# April 2017 "Where Excellence Is Expected"

### **District Begins Exploration of** On-site **Child Care Center**

t the March 6 Board of Education, Mrs. Schweitzer explained her concern regarding students leaving the district through open enrollment at the 4K level without having been in the school for even one day. Mrs. Schweitzer explained that in-home daycare providers have expressed that they are full and turning families away. She has spoken with parents who confirmed that there is a shortage of child care providers with openings in our district. Because of this, parents take their babies to child care providers in the towns that they work in. In four years, the children develop strong relationships and this leads parents to open enroll their children out to the school that the other kids in the daycare will attend.

Mrs. Schweitzer discussed her visit to the

Cambria-Friesland School District that most recently began an on-site child care program. While there were challenges to getting the center up and running, the 20 students they started with 18 months ago has grown to 80. Mrs. Schweitzer noted that CFSD offers childcare for children 6 weeks to 4K/5K ages and the center is open year round. She also noted that CFSD has seen an increase in the students open enrolling in because teachers living outside of the district will now bring all of the children with them in the morning, even the school age ones.

The Board agreed that the district should explore what the true need is in our community, which will then guide future actions. Mrs. Schweitzer and the Board agreed that the district will also need to connect with the inhome care providers as the process progresses. Look for the survey to be out in the coming weeks.

### **RFPs for Multipurpose Facility Sought**

he Board of Education approved the issuance of a Request For Proposal regarding the construction of a multipurpose facility. This structure would provide a specific space for the wrestling program, as well as an expanded area for weightlifting and fitness equipment.

Currently, the wrestling program is afforded space in the lunchroom at the end of the day each day. There are several challenges this arrangement presents that the multipurpose facility would adequately address. Additionally, the facility would afford a more effective means of instruction and oversight for physical education classes. The gross motor area (gym) is completely removed from the weight room, which has very limited space and cannot always accommodate all of the students comfortably. Having a gross motor area incorporated with the weights and the fitness equipment affords teachers the opportunity to run circuits and provide differentiated instruction while maintaining constant direct supervision. With the increased room, additional fitness center equipment could better meet the needs of our growing number of community members who are seeking a workout facility closer to home.

RFPs are due to District by March 29. A committee will then evaluate the responses and reduce the construction management pool down to a maximum of five. Each will participate in an interview and presentation session before one firm is chosen. Opportunities for input and to explore designs with costs will follow. Look for more information to come in future editions of The Link, as well as on our website.

### **Elementary/Middle School Testing Updates**:

<u>Wisconsin Forward Exam</u>: Students in Grades 3-8 will be taking the Wisconsin Forward Exam in April/May. This required assessment will be used to gauge how well students in Wisconsin are mastering the State Standards. Students in Grades 3-8 will be tested in English Language Arts and Mathematics. Students in Grades 4 & 8 will be tested in these subjects and also in Science and Social Studies

**STAR:** Students in K-8 will take their final STAR test of the year in May. The information from this test will give the staff the opportunity to look at whether or not the students obtained the goals that were set at the beginning of the year.

<u>PALS</u>: This is a required Wisconsin test that students in Grades K4-2 take in the fall and again in the spring. Shiocton students within these grade levels will be taking the spring PALS assessment in May.

<u>Summer School:</u> Registration will take place from April **3-21.** Students will be scheduled into classes on a first-come, first-serve basis. All fees must be paid at the time of registration.


## **Chief Spirit Lodge**


### **School Tool Box Sale**


