Four- and Five-Year-Old Kindergarten Registration

The Shiocton School District will be holding four- and five-year-old kindergarten registration the week of **February 15-19**, between 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. For



four-year-old kindergarten, registration packets will be mailed home during the first week of February to parents/guardians whose children are

eligible for the program. For five-year-old kindergarten, registration packets will be given to all students currently enrolled in the four-year-old program. Parents/guardians are asked to contact the elementary office at 986-3351 ext. 721 to request a registration packet if they do not receive one or if their child is not currently enrolled in the four-year-old program.

The forms within the packets are to be filled out and dropped off in the elementary office between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. during the week of registration. Registration will only take a few minutes. Parents are asked to bring their child's birth certificate on that date. It is not necessary for the child to be present.

Four-year-old Kindergarten: The four-year-old program is an optional program. Registration is open to all children in the district who will be four years old on or before September 1, 2016. Students in the program meet for two full days each week.

Five-year-old Kindergarten: To be eligible for this program, a child must be five years old on or before September 1, 2016. Students in this program meet for five full days each week.

Orientation Session: An orientation session will be offered in the spring. Watch for details.


Benefits from Healthy Lunches

Second semester began on January 21, and everyone is excited about the new classes and the opportunity to change things up. As we begin the second half of the school year I encourage parents to keep in touch with teachers and make sure that their child attends school regularly.

With the start of second semester I also want to take time and mention the **graduation policy** that is tied to our attendance policy. If you have a senior, please make sure that you understand the policy. The policy (which was passed at the July 16, 2007, school board meeting) states that, in the last semester of the student's senior year, the student must have no more than 10 unexcused class hours (once they have reached their 10 days as allowed by the State of Wisconsin). Any student having 11 unexcused class hours (past the 10 days) will not be allowed to

Seniors are Successful in Reality Check

For the tenth year, Shiocton seniors were again faced with the challenges of *Reality Check*, a financial literacy program designed to show students the realities of working in the real world of personal finances.

More than 35 business people from Shiocton and the surrounding area volunteered their expertise to make the event happen. On Wednesday, January 13, the seniors obtained mock checking accounts with the help of First National Bank. They came to school in their Sunday best to participate in an interview conducted by area business professionals in their career field of choice.

On Friday, January 15, *Reality Check* began. Seniors received their monthly income for their career choice and paid taxes. By creating stations, manned by community business people and volunteers, the seniors discovered how far their monthly paycheck would go. They purchased health insurance, autos, mortgages, food, daycare, even personal items and pets. Most were shocked at the price of daycare and health insurance. Many were frustrated when



The cost for families staying in the house is mainly made up through charitable donations. These houses allow families to stay together when it counts the most.

How Can We Support Ronald McDonald Houses? Many schools collect aluminum pop tabs for the Pull Tab Drive. In October 2007 we started the Shiocton Schools Pull Tab Drive. Since then we have been able to donate \$458.15 to the Madison and Milwaukee houses (\$229.50 each). We have collected 1202.3# of tabs so far. GREAT JOB, SHIOCTON STUDENTS!

music is a science

It allows a human being to take all these dry, technically boring (but difficult) techniques and use them to create emotion. That is one thing science cannot duplicate: humanism, feeling, emotion.

NOTICE to EDUCATIONAL OPTIONS for Children who Reside in the Shiocton School District

EDUCATIONAL OPTIONS

The School District of Shiocton is focused on providing a quality education to all of the students within our district. We strive for understanding and application; we educate so that all may meet the common expectation: "Shiocton, Where Excellence is Expected."

The District's primary educational pathway and instructional program for students involves a progression from 4-year-old-kindergarten through Grade 12 leading to a high school diploma. Schools in our district include Shiocton Elementary School (Grades ECH -8) and Shiocton High School (Grades 9-12).

Specific education programs offered to eligible students who are enrolled in and attending the District's schools include:

- Early Childhood (for students who are at least 3 years of age but not yet school-age)
- Special Education programming for students with disabilities
- English-language learner (ELL) education
- Gifted & Talented education

- Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs
- After School Tutoring
- Summer school education
- Individualized program and curriculum modifications, including at-risk and alternative education programming

In addition to the traditional, high quality education offered within our classrooms, Shiocton School District seeks to provide educational options to meet the diverse needs and interests of its students. Options include:

- CAPP/PIE courses through UWO, UWW, and other UW system schools (college credits)
- Transcript and Advanced Standing courses through FVTC (tech college credits or advanced standing)
- Career Pathway courses including industrystandard certifications
- KSCADE, Virtual, and Blend-ed courses
- Youth Options (courses at certain colleges & universities for students in Gr 11 & 12)

- Course Options (up to 2 courses at other educational institutions subject to state and local eligibility requirements including dual-credit opportunities
- Youth Apprenticeships
- 66.0301 enrollment agreements between school districts
- Other: open enrollment; private schools within 5 mile radius; part-time enrollment for homeschooled students

Additional educational options for children who reside within the District that involve full-time enrollment/attendance at a school, program or other educational institution other than a District school include the following:

- High school students meeting certain age and other eligibility requirements may be permitted to attend a technical college or certain other program for the purpose of completing a program leading to the student's high school graduation or to a high school equivalency diploma
- Full-Time Open Enrollment involving physical attendance in a public school of a nonresident school district or attendance through a virtual charter school that is associated with a non-resident school district

- Beginning in the 2016-17 school year, a child with a disability who meets the program's specific eligibility requirements may apply to attend an eligible, participating private school under a scholarship awarded through the state's "Special Needs Scholarship Program," as established under Wis. Stat. § 115.7915
- Enrollment in a private school participating in the Wisconsin parental choice program. The following participating private schools are located within the District's boundaries or within 5 miles of the District's boundaries (for transportation purposes):
 - Most Precious Blood Catholic School New London
 - Emmanuel Lutheran School New London
 - Bethlehem Lutheran School Hortonville
- Enrollment in a private school of the family's choosing (at the family's own cost, as applicable).
- Enrollment in a home-based private educational program as provided under state law.

Educational options for children who reside within the District but who are enrolled in and attending a private school or home-based private educational program include the following:

- Such students have the opportunity to attend summer school classes/programs offered in the District.
- Such students have the opportunity to participate in middle school after school athletic activities.
- Private school students in the high school grades have the opportunity to apply for approval to take up to two courses per semester in a District school, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 118.145(4).
- Students who are enrolled in a home-based private educational program have the opportunity to apply for approval to take up to two courses per semester in public schools as provided under Wis. Stat. § 118.53 and to participate in District interscholastic athletic athletics and other District extracurricular activities as provided under Wis. Stat. § 118.133.

SPECIAL NEEDS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

As per state budget bill 2015 Wisconsin Act 55 (https://docs.legis.wisconsin.gov/2015/related/acts/5) and Wisconsin State Statute Section 115.7915(5) (https://docs.legis.wisconsin.gov/statutes/statutes/115/V/7915/), school boards are required to annually notify the parents/guardians of each child with a disability enrolled in the school district of the new Special Needs Scholarship Program (private school voucher program), which is available to students with an individualized education program (IEP) who meet specified conditions outlined in state law.
