#### **SSD Piloting 10-day Quarantine**

In December, 2020, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) published two quarantine options designed to get persons back to work earlier. In addition to the gold-standard 14-day quarantine, the CDC approved the use of a 10-day quarantine and a 7-day quarantine with a negative test result. What was not widely publicized was that both of these additional options came with very stringent requirements in the days between return and Day 14.

When the options were released, the District chose to continue with the 14-day

quarantine because we had been successful in keeping the virus out of our school with that duration, as well as the fact that the longer holiday season was quickly approaching, which was a time when families were more likely to gather in large numbers with folks from out of town. At the same time, we acknowledged that we would continue to seek data and research on the two options and give renewed consideration to implementing one as we came into the new semester.

# CHIEF CHATTER Growing Closer to How it Used to Be

While our spring Parent/Teacher Conferences will be held virtually and our Science and Fine Arts Fair will hold a virtual tour, we are meeting in the next few weeks to discuss growing closer to how it used to be with regard to events like Gr 5 camp, band and choir trips, Prom, and graduation.

### SSD Piloting 10-day Quarantine (continued from Page 1)

Over the past several weeks, Mrs. Austin and I have reviewed much research and data points from the federal and state levels, as well as those from local districts who have implemented a reduced quarantine time. Specific time and attention has been devoted to reading through the expectations and responsibilities associated with a shortened quarantine time:

- Person reports for monitoring and recording of symptoms twice daily through Day 14
- · Person strictly adheres to 6' social distancing in all settings through Day 14
- Person refrains from participation in groups, avoids groups and crowds through Day 14
- Person refrains from participating in any activities such as classroom instruction, athletics, busing, before/after school programs, other cocurricular activities where 6' social distancing is not able to be maintained through Day 14

The challenge we have with a shorter quarantine, then, is that the responsibility to ensure that all of these additional expectations and actions are met and carried through will fall on the shoulders of school staff. Therefore, the District will remain with a 14-day quarantine period for all students and staff with the exception of junior and senior students.

#### Pilot Group: Juniors, Seniors

As noted in the Chief Chatter, we strive daily to use the information and experiences through today to improve our actions of tomorrow. As a result, we will be piloting the 10-day quarantine period with our juniors and seniors beginning February 8, 2021. A great many details still need to be worked out, as well as communication with students and parents, before the pilot can begin. Parents of junior and senior students should watch for more information at the end of January into the first week of February. It should be noted that the pilot is a voluntary offering such that parents and students can still select the 14-day quarantine, which is the gold standard per CDC and other health care providers.

Mrs. Austin and I will analyze the data collected from February 8 through March 12, which will be used when determining the next course of action regarding quarantine time.

## O'Brien, VerVoort Recognized by Board of Education

Also rising to meet a need in the community, Mrs. VerVoort sought out the certification so that she could better advise students and adults as they utilize the SFC and work towards life-long fitness. "We are very pleased that Mrs. VerVoort would take on the additional challenge of becoming a personal trainer.

Her new skills and knowledge sets will be of great benefit to the many adults and students that use the fitness center, but also to our staff, many of



whom already seek out suggestions and advice from Sarah. I know Sarah will feel much more confident in helping those in the fitness center achieve their goals and become healthier with this new learning behind her," stated Mrs. Schweitzer. Mrs. VerVoort is continuing her education in this area, seeking the next level of certification that would afford her the ability to offer group instruction.

For the fifteenth year, Shiocton seniors were faced with the challenges of Reality Check, a financial literacy simulation designed to allow students to explore the realities of personal finances in the

real world.

More than 20 volunteers from Shiocton and the surrounding area shared their expertise to make the event happen. In November, the seniors participated in



mock interviews with professionals in their chosen career field. Students created application materials and honed their interviewing skills prior to this event, applied those skills masterfully, and some students even walked away with job offers.

On Friday, January 8, Reality Check was held. Seniors received the monthly income for their career choice and a life status that included marital status, family status, and even pets. At stations manned by community volunteers, the seniors discovered how far their monthly paycheck would go. They purchased health insur-



ance, vehicles, mortgages, food, daycare, personal items, and supplies forpets. Most were shocked at the price of daycare and health insurance. Some students were frustrated when unforeseen expenses happened—just like in real life. Several had to make difficult financial decisions and sometimes had

to seek part-time employment. They definitely received a dose of reality.



# Finding and Sharing Great Kids' Books

Favorite stories get shared many times over. Here's some advice about how to find a good children's book and what to do once you're reading together with your child.

#### What to look for:

- Look for award-winning books. Each year the American Library Association selects children's books for the Caldecott Medal for illustrations and the Newbery Medal for writing.
- Check the book review section of newspapers and magazines for recommended new children's books.
- Check the Books and Authors section of www.ReadingRockets.org for recommendations and reviews.

**Remember:** Borrowing books from your local public library and swapping favorites with neighbors are two good ways to learn about new books.

#### What to do:

- Listen carefully as your child reads.
- Take turns. Read a paragraph (or page) and have your child read the next one.
- If your child has trouble reading a word, you can help in several ways:
  - Guide your child to use what he or she knows about letters and sounds to sound out the word.
  - Ask your child to skip over the word, read the rest of the sentence, and then say a word that would make sense in the story.
- Supply the correct word.
- Tell your child how proud you are of his or her efforts and skills.

**Remember:** Your child may be focusing more on how to read each word than on what the story means, so your reading helps to keep the story alive.



#### **DENTAL CLINIC**

On Tuesday, February 9, the Tri-County Dental Clinic will come to Shiocton Elementary school to offer a free dental screening and fluoride varnish to qualifying students. The qualification for participation in this program is that the student receives free or reduced cost hot lunch, and does NOT have private dental insurance. It is available for all students in grades PK-6th. This largely volunteerdriven, nonprofit clinic focuses on prevention and early intervention with youngsters who have limited access or whose families cannot afford dental care. The first phase of this program takes place at school with subsequent treatment either at school or at Tri-County Community Dental Clinic. All services are offered free of charge including dental cleaning and any restorative treatment a child may require. If you wish to have your child participate, and they meet the qualifications, please complete the forms your child brought home and return to school. 








