Dental Clinic Coming to Shiocton Elementary

On Tuesday, January 17, the Tri-County Dental Clinic will come to Shiocton Elementary School to offer a free dental screening and fluoride varnish to qualifying students. The qualification for participation in this program is that the student receives free or reduced-cost

hot lunch and is in preschool, kindergarten, or elementary school.

This largely volunteer-driven nonprofit clinic focuses on prevention and early intervention with youngsters who have limited

access to or whose families cannot afford dental care. The first phase of this program takes place at school, with subsequent treatment at Tri-County Community Dental Clinic in Appleton.

All services are offered free of charge, including dental cleaning and any restorative treatment a child may require. If you meet the qualification and wish to have your child participate, please return the forms that will be sent home with your child, or contact the school nurse, Rebecca Ecker, at 986-3351 ext. 714.

Are you interested in helping your kids with their homework, but could use some help yourself? Look no further than the Library Media Center link on the school district's webpage to get all the answers!

To begin, go to www.shiocton.k12.wi.us. Along the left side is a link to the Library Media Center. When you "hover" over that link, another menu flies out to the right. Choose "Home Access to Online Resources." You will be sent to a page that asks for an e-mail address OR a username and password. Do NOT enter an e-mail address! Instead, enter the username as "shiocton" and the password as "chiefs." A webpage will open that provides access to all the information sources that the school district subscribes to.

In most cases, no other username or password will be required. If an additional username or password is needed, that information is provided in the description of the website. These resources offer your child(ren) excellent information for homework, papers, projects, and more. News from the Nurse by Rebecca Ecker, RN

Attendance Guidelines from the Health Office

With the cold and flu season upon us it is important to remember a few things:

- When your child has a fever, he/she cannot attend school. A child with a temperature over 100 degrees should not be sent to school. Please do not allow your child to return to school until free of a fever for 24 hours.
 Giving medication such as Tylenol may temporarily reduce the fever but will not reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people.
- ♦ A child with **vomiting** and/or **diarrhea** should be kept home for at least 24 hours after the last episode to allow the body time to recuperate. Call your doctor if prompt improvement does not occur.
- A child with a deep or hacking-like cough belongs at home. If your child has coughing that is accompanied by a high fever or wheezing, you should consult their doctor immediately.
- A rash may be the first sign of many illnesses. Do not send your child to school with a widespread rash. Again consult your doctor before you send the child.

- A child with a mild cold or sore throat with no other symptoms may go to school. They should be encouraged as always to practice good hand washing.
- ♦ It is important that your child's emergency information is up to date. If you or your emergency contacts have any address or home/cell/work phone number changes, please update that information with the office as soon as possible.
- If your child does get sick at school, then you will need to have someone available to pick him/her up immediately. We need to keep other students and staff healthy and safe.
- If your child should require medication during the school day, <u>remember the school supplies no medication</u>. Medication must be brought in by an adult in the original labeled container along with a permission form from either parent.

Your cooperation on observing the above guidelines will be appreciated. Please contact the nurse or health aide or office if you have questions or concerns regarding this information.

Parents Who Host, Lose The Most: Don't be a Party to Underage Drinking is a public awareness campaign created by the Drug-Free Action Alliance to educate communities and parents about the health and safety risks of serving alcohol at teen parties. This awareness campaign takes place at state and local levels, concentrating



on celebratory times for youth, such as Homecoming, holidays, Prom, graduation, and other times when underage drinking parties are prevalent. This campaign encourages parents and the entire community to send a unified message that teen alcohol consumption is unhealthy, unsafe, and unacceptable.

Statistics show through our combined endeavors, the number of youth using alcohol has declined, but there is further work to be done. The fact is, underage drinking is hazardous to the health and safety of our children, and parents play a major role in their child's decision to make healthy choices.

What Parents Should Know

- ⇒ As a parent, you cannot give alcohol to your teen's friends under the age of 21 under any circumstance, even in your own home, even with their parents' permission.
- ⇒ You may be assuming legal liability allowing a person under 21 to remain in your home or on your property while consuming or possessing alcohol.

If You Break the Law

- ⇒ Others can sue you if you give alcohol to anyone of any age and they in turn hurt someone, hurt themselves, or damage property.
- ⇒ Officers can take any alcohol, money, or property used in committing the offense.
- ⇒ You will face court fines and possible jail time.

Things You Can Do as a Parent

- \Rightarrow Refuse to supply alcohol to teens.
- ⇒ Be at home when your teen has a get-together, set a start and end time, and make sure that anyone leaving the party is not allowed to return.
- ⇒ Make sure that alcohol is not brought to your home by your teen's friends.
- ⇒ Call the parents of any teen found to be in possession of alcohol.
- ⇒ Talk to other parents about not providing alcohol at other events your teen will be attending.
- ⇒ Think outside the box; brainstorm with your teen about some fun, alcohol-free activities for a memorable party.

What's Happening in Family and Consumer Education?

The Teens Taking Action class has been busy. They have continued making/selling soup to the staff and have added healthy muffins to their production schedule. Teaming up with Mr. Wismer's 8th grade Business/ Technology class, our students make banana chocolate chip muffins and apple pie muffins. The 8th grade students market and sell the product to students and staff right when they are most hungry—at the end of first hour. To make the muffins a bit healthier, we use yogurt and applesauce instead of oil and butter. Students haven't noticed the healthier substitutions. They just say the muffins are moist and yummy.

The World of Foods students have been researching countries around the world and have begun their individual presentations. We are finding that there are signature specialties from many countries. We have begun a "World Tour" of culinary dishes. The class started with soup: Greek avgolemono, wonton, Italian wedding soup, French onion soup, and posole. They are going to experience appetizers (hummus, bruschetta, baked brie, Spanish tortilla, and olive tapenade) next. After those beginning courses, students will experiment

with many main dishes. Of course, the study wouldn't be complete without signature desserts. We will go to Canada for nanaimo bars, Italy for biscotti, Mexico for sopapillas, France for profiteroles and pastry cream, and Australia for lamingtons. But after all that, we need to get back for the next class.

Also check with each of your institutions and find out what they offer for scholarships and when they are due. Due dates have passed for many already. Local scholarships are available and letters of recommendation should be requested. Don't wait until the last minute; teachers will turn you down if they do not have adequate time to prepare. Mock interviews – seniors will be matched up with real employers in the community to

conduct job interviews in the field that they are interested in. Please ask your child about this over the next couple of weeks. It is a great opportunity for our students to start building their network contacts.

All Students: It is time to start selecting classes for next year. We will be conducting class requests in class, so feel free to go online to the school's *Family Access* to look over your request with your parents. This should be a joint effort for you to be successful.

Juniors and Seniors:

If any upcoming juniors or seniors would like to take college courses for high school credit (better known as Youth Options), the paperwork is due by March 1 in the pupil services

For the sixth year, the seniors will get a dose of reality Shiocton style on Wednesday and Friday morning, January 11 and 13. The purpose of the program is to give the seniors a "heads up" of what to expect financially when they graduate from high school and college and enter the workforce. Blended Learning: Edmodo and the High School Classroom

Over the past several years, with the rapid growth of technology and Internet access, blended learning has become all the buzz in education circles. Blended learning consists of a combination of in-person instruction, along with online supplements that allow teacher and students an alternative way to connect. With online content, teachers are able to use the World Wide Web as their classroom, assign electronic assignments, and offer students the ability to utilize the technology that they use frequently in their everyday lives.

While there are many different online classroom software suites out there, one site has opened its doors to over 4.8 million teachers and students—Edmodo.com. According to the Edmodo.com website, "Edmodo promotes anytime, anyplace learning. Functionally, it allows teachers to post messages, discuss classroom topics, assign and grade classwork, share content and materials, and network and exchange ideas with their peers—but in reality, it is so much more."

Edmodo is super user-friendly, especially if you are one of the 800+ million people on Facebook. The interface looks and acts just like Facebook, allowing students the ability to learn how to navigate it very quickly.

Some of the many uses of Edmodo include:

- A calendar that allows teachers to post due dates and announcements for upcoming projects or tests
- Create assignments that can be turned in, marked up, and graded directly on Edmodo
- Create quizzes that are automatically graded, so students get immediate feedback
- Creation of surveys to get student opinions

- Large or small group online discussions
- A library feature that allows teachers to post handouts and assignments for access by students
- A "parent" account that allows parents to view the calendar and assignments posted for their child for each class they are in

A number of teachers at Shiocton High School are currently using Edmodo. Responding to a short questionnaire, six teachers are actively using Edmodo in the high school, with three more looking to integrate it next semester. Depending upon the teacher, they may be using it in all of their classes or just a few.

Señor Nielsen started using Edmodo in all of his Spanish classes after an in-service program on the website. "I already used it to tell students about a key verb on a quiz in Spanish 4 and 5. I also have two students who are traveling to Mexico this weekend, and part of their assignment is to post abroad about their experiences so the whole class can be updated."

With the growing use of technology in education, both at the secondary and post-secondary levels, Edmodo is a great tool to introduce students to the world of blended learning.



This month in second grade we will be studying animals for science class. We will learn about mammals, amphibians, fish, reptiles, and birds. We'll become experts at identifying the characteristics of each group of animals. This is an exciting unit for all of our little animal lovers!

In math we have finished our units on multiplication. Multiplication is tough for third graders. Students need to work on memorizing the facts. The easiest way is to read the problem while looking at the answer, and then after they think they know the answer, practice the problem without looking at the answer. Work on memorizing 2-3 problems every night. Also, this is important as we do Rocket Math!

We look forward to our educational field trip to The Building for Kids (Appleton) on January 13. Here the kids will do some kitchen chemistry, explore the museum, and see *Super Kids Save the World*. We also anticipate going snow-



shoeing at Mosquito Hill on February 10. If there isn't enough snow, we will go winter hiking. We hope the weather cooperates. If it is too cold that day, we will reschedule. All parents who want to go with us are welcome; however, parents will need to car pool and the students must ride the bus.

All classrooms discussed and brainstormed effective ways to handle conflict in a healthy way. Grades 1-5 all created yellow "Care Notes" which include the following formula:

- \Rightarrow I feel...
- \Rightarrow When you...
- ⇒ Please...

"I" statements were discussed and role-played in all classrooms. Students are encouraged to keep these cards as a reference to help them communicate in a way that is productive and helpful. In addition, the 5th graders presented small skits to our K5 students on how to communicate effectively with the "I feel" statements.

Middle School Communication — Facebook

Facebook is an ever-growing network for ALL ages throughout the world. A large majority of students communicate electronically via cell phones, chatting, instant messaging, and through Facebook. Facebook is a great networking tool and can be a lot of fun if it is used in a safe way. Students were educated in how to remain safe online and on Facebook so their identities do not become public knowledge. The following are tips and suggestions to students and parents regarding online safety:

- Make sure your Facebook account is "Private." When created, all accounts are public and open for anyone to see. Ensure your child has their account listed as "friends only" under the Account Settings tab.
- Ensure that passwords for logins are never shared (except with parents).
- Use a different login name or screen name for chatting, Facebook, and instant messaging so that your identity cannot be tracked.
- Never accept a friend request from someone that you do not know.
- Refrain from posting pictures that would reveal your identity or location.

Take a walk in someone else's shoes.

That's what our 3rd-5th grade students worked on this month. Students discussed what empathy is and how to effectively communicate to another that they identify how someone might be feeling. Empathy is



not fixing a problem or situation. It is simply showing someone you can identify how they may be feeling. Encourage your child to "Put themselves in someone else's shoes" when they are faced with differences or challenges.

Shining Bright on SILA's Showcase Night


