


Registration for 2015-16

This is a perfect way to describe the 2014-15 forensics season for the Shiocton Middle School and Shiocton High School teams as a whole. Forensics takes a great deal of time and practice to get the words right, but it takes great skill and creativity to get the emotion shared with the audience. That is exactly what our middle school and high school forensics teams did this year!

Middle School

The middle school team started practicing in the beginning of October. All interested students met with me to decide on a category to perform and find a literary piece to present at the competitions. Eleven students from 7th and 8th grade participated in Play Acting (Megan Pigsley, Chiara Van Camp, Morgan Brux, Mikayla Henry, Dashal Mentzel, and Tanner Baeten), News Reporting (Samantha Scott, Jadyn Walker, and Dylan Van Camp), or Readers' Theater (Payton Schnur and Paige Stein). These dedicated young people practiced every lunch and recess from the middle of October through the end of February. Two of the groups even wrote their own plays.

The competitions for middle school were in January and February. Both the Level 1 and Level 2 competitions were held at The Classical Charter School in Appleton. All of the groups performed well at Level 1; however, the News Reporting group did not proceed to Level 2. At Level 2, the students who



Quiz Bowl Team Competes at State and National Level



Concession Stand Upgrade

Vern Louis' building trades class remodeled the outside of the football concession stand this spring. Students put exterior vinyl siding on the stand and replaced two entrance doors to the bathrooms. The project saved the school time and money by having students complete it and served as a learning experience for them. Groundskeeper Dan Nabbefeld also contributed by helping the students in the construction.

"The students learned how to work with what was already there," Louis said. "They had to plumb everything up to make sure it was straight vertically and horizontally, and cut angles for the gable ends. They also had to put barrier down around the base of the building. Before we went out there, we figured out how much material was going to be needed, and we figured that out as a group. Then we gave our list to the maintenance department, and they went out and bought the materials and delivered everything to the site. From there it was taking measurements and making sure everything was horizontal and vertical."

One of the obstacles the students faced was trying to make a building look level that was not. Weather was also an obstacle early in the month.

The class all agreed that they were proud of their accomplishment and all feel the finished product looks good.

8th Graders Use Math to Build Birdhouses

My 8th grade math students were hard at work applying what they learned with area measurements and spatial reasoning to real world projects. The high school tech. ed. students, along with Mr. Doro, generously measured and cut pieces according to dimensions needed to accommodate the type of birdhouse each student chose: Eastern bluebird, chickadee, wren, downy woodpecker, or nuthatch. My students used the precut pieces to assemble the birdhouse — not as easy as one may think.

Students then were welcomed into the shop with Mr. Louis assisting. He taught them how to safely use a nail/staple gun. With Mr. Louis assisting, students stapled their houses. When the birdhouses were finished, students had to apply what they learned for area measurements, having to measure the birdhouses keeping in mind angles and diameter (bird entry). When the project was complete, students took the birdhouses home for their new bird friends. We had fun with this project!!

The following are the immunization requirements for the **2015-16** school year for your child. Unless a waiver has been signed, all students are required to have their immunizations up to date on the first day of the new school year. Students entering 6th grade will need to receive a Tdap vaccine. Students entering 5K will need to have a series of vaccines to be compliant with immunization law. Please provide the school with a copy of any new immunizations your child has received. Plan ahead and have your child immunized prior to the beginning of the school year. Summer Fire Safety

Every year Americans look forward to summer vacations, camping, family reunions, picnics, and the Fourth of July. Summertime, however, also brings fires

and injuries due to fireworks and outdoor cooking. Follow these simple tips to help you and those you love stay fire safe this summer season.



- Enjoy outdoor celebrations and cookouts, but remember to keep a 3-foot "safe zone" around grills and campfires. Open your gas grill before lighting. Keep an eye on your grill, fire pit, or patio torches. Never leave any of them unattended.
- Build campfires at least 15 feet away from tent walls, shrubs, or other materials that burn. Never use flammable liquids to ignite or keep your fire burning. Keep campfires small and do not let them get out of hand. Never allow children or pets near the fire, and do not leave them unsupervised. Teach kids how to stop, drop, and roll if their clothing catches fire. Have a fire extinguisher on hand for emergencies, and teach children how to use it. Keep plenty of water nearby, and have a shovel for throwing sand on the fire if it gets out of control.
- Attend public fireworks displays and leave the lighting to the professionals. A study by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) shows that over 200 people on average go to the emergency room every day with fireworks-related injuries in the month around the July 4th holiday. Fireworks are dangerous!

Follow these safety tips if using fireworks:

- Never allow young children to play with or ignite fireworks.
- Avoid buying fireworks that are packaged in brown paper, because this is often a sign that the fireworks were made for professional displays and that they could pose a danger to consumers.
- Always have an adult supervise fireworks activities. Parents don't realize that young children suffer injuries from sparklers. Sparklers burn at temperatures of about 2,000 degrees—hot enough to melt some metals.
- Never place any part of your body directly over a fireworks device when lighting the fuse. Back up to a safe distance immediately after lighting fireworks.
- Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully.
- Never point or throw fireworks at another person.
- Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap.
- Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly.
- Never carry fireworks in a pocket or shoot them off in metal or glass containers.
- After fireworks complete their burning, douse the spent device with plenty of water from a bucket or hose before discarding it to prevent a trash fire.
- Make sure fireworks are legal in your area before buying or using them.
