opportunity to continue on the path of progress that we have started down."

No Time to Rest

First, let me take just another moment to express our sincere appreciation to the Shiocton community for passing the referendum at the polls on February 17. I greatly appreciate the many community members that assisted in the referendum efforts and the many community members that braved cold temperatures to attend informational meetings so as to be informed as they voted.

While we took a few minutes on Wednesday to appreciate the vote of confidence, now is no time to rest. With the referendum behind us, we can turn our attentions to important educational matters. At the March 2 Board of Education meeting, we will move forward with our curriculum plans. We will ask the board to approve the purchase of grades seven and eight Big Ideas math, which is the continuation of instruction at the middle level of Math Expressions. Traditional textbooks will be replaced by eTexts and online practice books. We will also move forward with the purchase of a formal science series at the elementary level.

The co-curricular rotation will be finished soon so that needed equipment and supplies can be purchased by our athletic teams and fine arts groups.

Though the plan will likely be tweaked over the next two years, it is a solid starting point of recognition and support for our educators, and a means with which to retain these valued employees.

Budget-wise, we maintain responsibility for fiscal prudence and the direct oversight of both our revenues and expenditures.

Meet the Candidates Who Are Seeking a Seat on the School Board

There are three candidates vying to fill two seats.

Stacey Warning

Hello! My name is Stacey Warning and I will be on the April ballot in hopes of receiving your vote for a seat on the Shiocton School Board. I am excited about this opportunity *The Link* has given me to introduce myself to you. My parents, George and Patty Ronk, raised me on a dairy farm a few miles south of Shiocton. I attended elementary, middle, and high school at Shiocton. Upon graduation, I ventured to Denison University in Granville, Ohio, for my undergraduate degree. While I truly cherish the four years I spent at Denison University, those four years away from home made me realize how special Shiocton really is. After graduating from Denison University, I migrated closer to home by attending law school at Hamline University School of Law in St. Paul, Minnesota. I am now working for WOW Logistics Company in Appleton as a Staff Attorney.

Ronald McDonald House Pull Tab Program Update

Shiocton students have collected 40 pounds of pull tabs during the first semester of the 2014-15 school year. We were paid \$16 for the tabs. We sent checks to the Madison and Milwaukee Ronald McDonald Houses for \$8 each. This money will help cover the cost for families to stay at the houses while their children undergo medical treatment.

Since we started the Shiocton Schools Pull Tab Drive in October 2007, we have collected 1,146.3 pounds of tabs. We have been able to donate \$441.35 to the Madison and Milwaukee houses (\$221 each). WOW! GREAT JOB, SHIOCTON STUDENTS!

1,146.3 pounds of tabs equals approximately 1,452,362 tabs. If these tabs were placed end to end, they would stretch 24.3 miles. Just to give you an idea, the distance between Shiocton and Kimberly is 24 miles.

Please continue to save your pull tabs and drop them off in the collection box by the elementary school office. I will update you at the end of the year about how many tabs we have collected during the second semester.

We will be testing ALL juniors at Shiocton High School in the morning (on both of those days). We have been preparing our students for the upcoming test by hosting ACT Prep Sessions in English, Math, Work Keys, and Writing. Please encourage your child (if they are a junior) to get a good night's sleep before testing.

Parent/Teacher Conferences will



be held on March 4 from 4:30-7:30 p.m. Good communication and regular

attendance benefits the students and leads to better grades.

competition between Central Wisconsin Conference schools that consists of answering




questions on a variety of topics that include math, English, social studies, science, and various other topics, such as sports and entertainment.

Four Wrestlers Advance to State Tournament

Of the six Shiocton wrestlers competing in the Sectional on February 21, four advanced to the State Individual Wrestling Tournament: Austin Riehl, Henry Fielding, Mason Gomm, and Sawyer Theobald. Austin Riehl (145) finished in first place at the Sectional and has a record of 36-2. Henry Fielding (182) finished second and has a 41-2 record. Mason Gomm (195) placed second and has a record of 22-3. Sawyer Theobald (113) finished in third place and has a 39-4 record. Also wrestling at the Sectional were Sammy Van Straten (36-7) and Garrett Gunderson (24-7), who both placed fourth. The State Tournament is February 26-28 in Madison.



Wrestlers Wrapping Up a Great Season

Shiocton traveled to Plainfield for the CWC Multi-Dual at Tri-County High School. As a team, we went 4-1 for the day. The third match was by far the most exciting as we wrestled Bonduel, another team on top of the CWC. The dual ended in a 42-42 tie which went into the tenth criteria and came down to the greater number of takedowns during the dual. Shiocton won by having one more takedown than Bonduel for the day, giving them the go-ahead point and making the score 43-42 in our favor.

Shiocton lost its last dual of the day to Cashton. Due to illness, our team was without two of its wrestlers, Raymond Herb and Garrett Gunderson. We held out another of our leading wrestlers due to injury, which made a big difference in the outcome and final score. I am fairly confident we would have been 5-0 as a team if we had those three in the line-up, but the rest of our guys wrestled very well and kept it interesting all the way to the end. It's tough to take a loss when you don't have your full line-up, but these things happen and we made the best of it.



Another highlight for Shiocton was Henry Fielding accumulating his 100th win by pinning Kyle Loehrke of Weyauwega-Fremont in 1:08 during the fourth dual of the day. Wrestlers who were 5-0 were Sawyer Theobald at 113 with two pins, Sammy Van

Straten at 132 with four pins, Mason Gomm at 195 with three pins, and Henry Fielding at 182 with five pins. Going 4-0 was Austin Riehl at 145 with one pin. Wrestlers who were 4-1 included Gunnar Oskey at 106 with one pin and Levi Snortum at 126 with three pins. Wrestlers who were 3-2 included Trevor Bruns at 120, Trevor Young at 152 with one pin, and Trent Moder at 170 with one pin. Other wrestlers contributing for the day were Blake Johnson at 138 and Ben Gunderson at 220.

Overall, we wrestled very well. Our freshmen really stepped up and helped our upperclassmen out quite a bit. It's great to see some of the pressure taken off of our older guys. I am really happy with how we are wrestling



at this point of the season. The focus is definitely to keep improving each week, as well as trying to keep our wrestlers as healthy as possible as we approach the end of the season. With the win over Bonduel, we are still in the

hunt for the conference championship, which will be challenging as we will have to beat conference favorite Wittenberg-Birnamwood when they come to Shiocton for our final dual.

Shiocton faced conference opponent Wittenberg-Birnamwood. This was a big match that would determine the Central Wisconsin Conference dual meet champion, which is the first step to winning the conference championship, with the conference tournament being the second step. We had a very large and energetic crowd. The dual came down to the very last match with Shiocton down by five points, which made it that much more exciting and intense for the fans.

Winning by pin for Shiocton was Gunnar Oskey at 106 (2:15). Winning by technical fall were Austin Riehl at 152 (20-5) and Garrett Gunderson at 160 (16-0). Art 101: College Credit Art Class at Shiocton Begins with Making Books

Art 101: CAPP (Cooperative Academic Partnership Program), which is in conjunction with UW-Oshkosh so students can earn three college humanities credits, is being taught at Shiocton High School for the first time this spring semester. Mr. Greider, who has his Masters of Fine Arts from the University of Arizona, has taught at UW-Oshkosh as an Adjunct Professor for evening classes since 1999 and has been approved to teach the Art 101 course.

The class is set up for non-art majors as an introductory course in general art. Students are first learning about how to make a basic book, with a focus on the process of what a book is and combining that with a theme of their choice. After an introduction to bookmaking and the various types of handmade book techniques, students participated in the creation of a group accordion style book (pictured below), and then began working out ideas in their sketchbooks for their own designs. The photographs included on the next page show several student projects in process and some imagery from their sketchbooks, which they are required to work in regularly and which become part of their final evaluation. A group critique after each project will summarize each unit. The semester lessons include units on:

- Relief and intaglio printmaking
- Old Masters painting interpretation in 3-dimensional Bas Relief – ceramics
- Autobiographical Still-life painting acrylic on canvas board
- How to Read a visual art work one-page evaluation of a master work of art
- Puppetry Design with a presentational mini-play option
- Silverpoint Drawing...The Media of the Renaissance Masters




The course is designed to give non-art majors experience in a variety of 2D and 3D studio art media and techniques in an effort to expand their knowledge, appreciation, and understanding of art and design within the context of the liberal arts. Course objectives require that

the students will:

- Identify the elements and principles of design, analyze how artists/designers use them to produce a work of art, and consciously apply them in the creative process.
- Demonstrate the ability to create 3D objects and 2D images using a variety of materials, tools, and working procedures.
- Apply imagination, creative problem solving abilities, and critical thinking skills in class assignments and projects.
- Practice observational drawing.
- Actively participate in studio critiques, providing meaningful criticism of work created by others and using art vocabulary effectively.
- Maintain a sketchbook/process book throughout the course to document ideas, practice skills, visualize projects, and plan a course of action.
- Investigate a variety of cultural, contemporary, and historical art as resources, inspiration, and content.
- Use correct art vocabulary/terminology to describe, analyze, and interpret a work of art in a written or verbal presentation.
- Connect art experiences to daily life and build awareness of artists' and designers' amazing contribution to our communities and culture.



An Art Room Remembered...

When I was a young art teacher, I had this idea of what an art room should look like if I had my own, should I find a full-time job in the future. I don't remember much of the classrooms when I was a kid at St. Patrick's Parish, but I do remember finding out I liked art in 3rd grade with Sister Celia. She had an art minor in her background besides being our 3rd grade teacher and when we had art, once every two weeks for 30 minutes, I shone.

I was what I would call a challenging kid....I lost my mother when I was seven years old. She left one night and my father got custody. I don't know if I would have been a really good student, but I do know that I was really in a tailspin throughout most of elementary school because of how lost I felt. In Catholic schools we didn't have art classes normally. The Sisters still wore habits, we attended church every day, and our Principal, Sister Kevin, used the large paddle she had hanging on her door regularly.

When I got to 3rd grade, it was the first time we had a period where we could make art, and that was only because of Sister Celia. She had art on the walls of the room that she had made while she was in seminary school. She had posters of the Saints and posters of images from Michelangelo's Sistine Chapel ceiling masterpiece. I remember one project where we filled milk cartons with plaster and a balloon. When the plaster became hard, we cut off the carton, took out the deflated balloon, and had to create something with what was left. I looked at my plaster form and saw a horse that was rising up along one side of the rectangle and into the other side of it. I painted it with tempera paint and incised the outline of the legs. Sister Celia was so impressed by it, she asked me how I had come up with it, and she called Sister Kevin down to show her. It was the only time I remember Sister Kevin ever smiling about something I had done. I started to come out of myself and feel happy again and look forward to coming to school.

That room set the stage for my time at Shiocton. When I look at my room here, I see all the art that students have made up on the walls. Some is from the previous year's groups and some goes all the way back to when I started here in 1996. The years and past students are all now a blur. A few kids have gone on to art careers, but the vast majority have not. But I know somewhere in the future, when my students grow up and have kids of their own, art career types or not, their kids will bring home some treasure they made in their art class, and a light will turn on in their memories of when they were kids in art class here at Shiocton.

I have come to realize that it's not about the walls and what's on them that makes an art room special. It is the people in it that make it special. Thank you, Sister Celia, and thank you, Shiocton.

WOW, we have been in school for over 100 days! The kindergartners are a little more independent. They can tie their shoes, read simple books, solve math problems, and much, much more.

March is the month of leprechauns, shamrocks, spring, and St. Patrick's Day. Our students will attempt to catch those tricky little leprechauns in hopes of

getting their gold. How are they going to achieve this? Each child will construct a comfy little home (a.k.a. trap – but we can't say the "t" word) for the leprechauns. Will they have the luck of the Irish and get the leprechauns' gold for themselves?



Themes for the month are Around the Town and Neighborhood Helpers. We will study different places in a town and how people join together to help one another in their communities. Children will learn about jobs, how people work together, and places they go in their neighborhoods.

In reading and language arts, we will review letters and sounds we have learned and work on sight words and reading. Sight words for March are yes, no, mom, dad, day, too, went, of, will, get, if, saw, say, good, how, into, jump, and man. We've been working on our "stretchy snake" skill by pulling words into smaller parts (segmenting words) and blending letter sounds together to make words. This is only one of the many strategies your child is learning. To find out more, please attend the parent/teacher reading meeting on Wednesday, March 4, at your designated time, which was stated on the letter that came home with your child.

Kindergartners are listening and responding to stories and learning how to use pictures and context to make predictions. They are learning to identify setting, characters, and important events, as well as identifying the problem and solution in the story. They are starting to understand text patterns and learning to make inferences and how to connect life experiences to the text. The children are encouraged to use letters and phonetically spelled words to write about experiences, stories, people, objects, or events.

In Math Expressions we will be working on the consolidation of concepts. Children will work on creating and solving story problems and make drawings or write equations to represent problem situations. They will continue to identify all partners of numbers from 2-10 and teen numbers, write addition equations to represent the partners, as well as work on achieving fluency in adding and subtracting within five.



Conservation and Environmental Awareness Speaking Competition

The fifth grade gifted and talented reading students chose an area of environmental awareness that they felt needed to be addressed. They were encouraged to select a subject that concerned local problems as much as possible. They researched their subject to obtain authentic and accurate information. It was then up to them to emphasize the conservation aspect of their subject. Two of the

students, Olivia Conradt and Larissa Young (pictured at right), chose to take it one step further. They took their project and competed in the



Conservation and Environmental Awareness Speaking Competition hosted at the Shiocton School District on February 5. They were up against 11 other students in the Elementary Division (grades 5-6). Fifth Graders Learn About Prepositions

The fifth graders learned that a preposition is a word which shows relationships among other words in the sentence. The relationships include direction, place, time, cause, manner, and amount.

In itself, a word like "in" or "after" is rather meaningless. Prepositions are nearly always combined with other words called prepositional phrases. Prepositional phrases tend to be built in the same way: a preposition followed by a determiner and an adjective or two, followed by a pronoun or noun (called the object of the preposition). This whole phrase takes on a modifying role, acting as an adjective or adverb, locating something in time and space, modifying a noun, or telling when or where or under what conditions something happened.

Fifth graders know some rules regarding prepositions such as:

- a preposition is followed by a noun; it is never followed by a verb.
- a prepositional phrase always begins with a preposition and ends with a noun or pronoun, which is called the object of the preposition.
- a subject can never be part of a prepositional phrase, and a verb can never be part of a prepositional phrase.

With this knowledge students had fun creating "Prepositional Phrase Poems."


Eat right with MyPlate

Before you eat, think about what goes on your plate or in your bowl. Foods like vegetables, fruits, whole grains, low-fat dairy products, and lean protein foods contain the nutrients you need without too many calories. Over the day, include foods from all the food groups.

Try the following tips to "Get Your Plate in Shape."

Make half your plate fruits and vegetables

Eat a variety of vegetables, especially dark green, red, and orange vegetables plus beans and peas. Fresh, frozen, and canned vegetables all count. Choose "reduced sodium" or "no-salt-added" canned vegetables. Add fruit to meals and snacks. Buy fruits that are dried, frozen, or canned in water or 100% juice, as well as fresh fruits.



salt (sodium) in foods you buy. Compare sodium in foods and choose those with lower numbers. Add spices or herbs to season food without adding salt. Make major sources of saturated fats such as desserts, pizza, cheese, sausages, and hot dogs occasional choices, not every day foods. Select lean cuts of meat or poultry and fat-free or

low-fat milk, yogurt, and cheese. Switch from solid fats to oils when preparing food.

Enjoy your food, but eat less

Get your personal daily calorie limit at www.ChooseMyPlate.gov. Keep that number in mind when deciding what to eat. Avoid oversized portions. Use a smaller plate, bowl, and glass. Cook more often at home, where you are in control of what's in your

food. When eating out, choose lower calorie menu options. Choose dishes that include vegetables, fruits, and whole grains. Write down what you eat to keep track of how much you eat. If you drink alcoholic beverages, do so sensibly. Limit it to one drink a day for women or two drinks a day for men.

Make at least half your grains whole

Choose 100% whole grain breads, cereals, crackers, pasta, and brown rice. Check the ingredients list on food packages to find whole grain foods.

Switch to fat-free or low-fat milk

Fat-free and low-fat milk have the same amount of calcium and other essential nutrients as whole milk, but less fat and calories. If you are lactose intolerant, try lactose-free milk or a calcium-fortified soy beverage.

Vary your protein choices

Eat a variety of foods from the protein food group each week, such as seafood, nuts, and beans, as well as lean meat, poultry, and eggs. Twice a week, make seafood the protein on your plate. Keep meat and poultry portions small and lean.

Cut back on sodium and empty calories from solid fats and added sugars

Drink water instead of sugary drinks. Select fruit for dessert. Eat sugary desserts less often. Choose 100% fruit juice instead of fruit-flavored drinks. Look out for

Be physically active your way

Pick activities that you like and start by doing what you can, at least 10 minutes at a time. Every bit adds up, and health benefits increase as you spend more time being active.

- Children and teens: Get 60 minutes or more a day.
- Adults: Get two hours and 30 minutes or more a week of activity that requires moderate effort such as brisk walking.
