#### Middle School Paper Recycling Fundraiser a Huge Success!

Last year the middle school started a paper recycling fundraiser with US Paper Mills in Menasha. Several times during the year there was a large yellow dumpster in the back of school that served as a collection point for any and all paper recyclables the community wished to



toss in. The full dumpsters went to US Paper Mills, and they paid us the market value of the paper. US Paper Mills runs on 100% recycled paper and cardboard.

The response

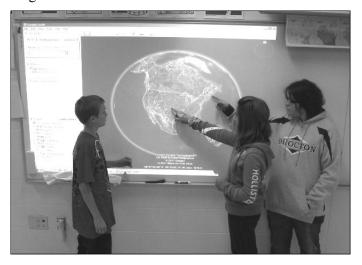
from the school and community was outstanding. The school, with generous help from the custodians, collected the recyclable paper and stockpiled it between drives. So many community members helped obtain and drop off paper recyclables that it would be impossible to list them all. The community support was evident when the final earnings were tabulated. We raised a whopping \$5,170 over the year.

The money was used to purchase one Bright Link for the middle school. A Bright Link (*pictured below*) is an interactive projector mounted in a classroom and connected to that classroom's computer. The Bright Link

can then be used for interactive lessons and also as a projector for movies, notes, assignments,



and Internet activities. The entire cost of the Bright Link unit was \$2,711. Pictured below are students using the Bright Link.



With community support high, I am sure that we can equal or exceed last year's totals. With leftover funds of \$2,459 from last year and this year's earnings, we should be in a position to purchase two Bright Link units for the middle school. Please consider dropping off your paper recyclables during any of the upcoming paper drives.

#### **National Honor Society Eligibility**

I wanted to take a moment to make parents and students aware of the eligibility requirements for National Honor Society. In order to be eligible, a student must have a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or higher for at least three consecutive semesters. However, a strong GPA is not the only factor in determining membership. While scholarship is important, inductees will also be judged on service to community, leadership, and character.

Students who qualify will receive a letter after the start of second semester explaining the application process. The materials requested to apply for NHS will aid in the decision of the Faculty Council, a group of five high school teachers who know the student body well and vote on membership issues. New members will be inducted to NHS if they receive a majority vote from the Faculty Council.

Induction to NHS is a privilege and an honor, not a right. Even though students might meet the GPA requirement, they may not be selected. However, if they are still in school next year and maintain the high standard of learning, they can be eligible again.



I encourage all students interested in being inducted to NHS to maintain high academic achievement and strive toward the NHS pillars of scholarship, service, leadership, and character. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me anytime.

#### Making Friends in Early Childhood

We look forward to some "Fall Fun" as we learn about the changing seasons.

#### A Brand New Bunch in K5

It's a brand new year and a brand new group of fiveyear-old kindergartners! All of the students are settling in to their new routine. Each and every day they practice writing their names and learning the names of their friends.

So far this year during math time we have been exploring all of our different manipulatives. These are different types of counters that the students sort and arrange into patterns or shapes. Many of the children simply enjoy stacking them as high as they can! Sometimes after the students have been working with the manipulatives, we all take a "gallery walk" around the tables to see how everyone else used the manipulatives.

We are learning to read in kindergarten. We know a few new sight words, such as *a*, *the*, *red*, *orange*, and *green*. We will be practicing *my*, *blue*, *I*, *like*, *purple*, *yellow*, *am*, *brown*, *at*, *black*, *go*, and *we*. It is so exciting to hear the students read and recognize the new words. Along with the words, we are also practicing writing letters. So far we have worked on *Mm* and *Ss*. We will also be working on *Rr*, *Tt*, *Pp*, *Cc*, *Aa*, *Nn*, and *Dd* very soon. Each week the teachers are sending home paper books for the children to use and keep in their own library. These may come in handy for car rides, too!

Our daily centers are underway! We have had many parent helpers and they are VERY much appreciated. It is so important to be able to create smaller groups and provide more learning opportunities for our students. During these centers we keep busy by reading, cutting, gluing, counting, and snacking. Centers are one of the most important parts of our kindergarten day!

Beginning next month and continuing through the school year, each K5 student has the opportunity to be the Star Child for a week. During their special week, we learn more about the children through questions, special items brought from home, etc. The class designs a book about the star for him or her to keep as a memory from their special week!



Since October is Fire Safety month, we are looking forward to visiting the Shiocton-Bovina Fire Station! It is always exciting for the students to have opportunities to see and learn about the important community services provided in their town. We have

tentatively planned our visit for Wednesday, October 12. Kindergartners do have homework. Each night please review the sight words, letter cards, and new book bag

The following tips will help guide your conference and can be used for students at all levels:

#### Before the conference

- Decide what you want to ask the teacher and write the questions down.
- Consider making a list for your child's teacher of things that will help create a better understanding of your child; for example, family conflicts, feelings about school, hobbies, special health problems.
- Ask your child some questions: What's your favorite subject? What's your least favorite? What do you want me to tell your teacher?
- Be on time if you have an appointment. If you can't make the conference as scheduled, call and notify the teacher.

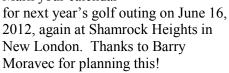
#### During the conference

- If you have a specific point to discuss or have a complaint, listen to the teacher's point before criticizing.
- The teacher may have some questions, too, not trying to pry into your personal life, but only to obtain information that will help her or him to work better with your child.
- Before you leave, develop an action plan. If need be, set up a way to check on your child's progress. You and the teacher can decide how best to stay in touch. Finally, follow through with the plan.
- Leave promptly to allow other parents to have time with the teacher. If you feel the need to continue, schedule another conference with the teacher.

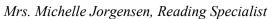

This is a 10-question sheet that covers a wide range of third grade math concepts, such as measurement, picture graphs, word problems, shapes, and also the four main math processes. This is an "on their own' activity to see what they know, and then we answer as a group.

Just a reminder that students are required to read at least 15 minutes every night to equal 75 minutes a week. Remember to mark the number of minutes in your child's agenda and initial it.

Our first quarter book report project is reading a sports book or a biography. Once done reading the book, students will create a mobile to hang in the classroom. This is due by November 4. These book report dates are in your child's Friday folder. Please call or e-mail if you have any questions.

## News from the Nurse — Dietary Guidelines for Americans

The Dietary Guidelines for Americans, 2010 are developed by the United States Department of Agriculture and are the best science-based advice on how to eat for health. The Guidelines encourage all Americans to eat a healthy diet and be physically active. Choose My Plate is an initiative based on these guidelines to help consumers make better food choices. MyPlate illustrates the five food groups using a familiar mealtime visual, a place setting.



Below are 10 tips to a great plate. Use the ideas in this list to balance your calories, to choose foods to eat more often, and to cut back on foods to eat less often.

#### 1. Balance Calories

Find out how many calories you need for a day as a first step in managing your weight. Go to www.ChooseMyPlate.gov to find your calorie level. Being physically active also helps you balance calories.

- 2. Enjoy Your Food, But Eat Less Take the time to fully enjoy your food as you eat it. Eating too fast or when your attention is elsewhere may lead to eating too many calories. Pay attention to hunger and fullness cues before, during, and after meals. Use them to recognize when to eat and when you've had enough.
- 3. Avoid Oversized Portions
  Use a smaller plate, bowl, and glass. Portion out foods before you eat. When eating out, choose a smaller size option, share a dish, or take home part of your meal.

- 4. Foods To Eat More Often Eat more vegetables, fruits, whole grains, and fatfree or 1% milk and dairy products. These foods have the nutrients you need for health—including potassium, calcium, vitamin D, and fiber. Make them the basis for meals and snacks.
- 5. Make Half Your Plate Fruits and Vegetables Choose red, orange, and dark-green vegetables like tomatoes, sweet potatoes, and broccoli along with other vegetables for your meals. Add fruit to meals as part of main or side dishes or as dessert.
- 6. Switch to Fat-Free or Low-Fat (1%) Milk
  They have the same amount of calcium and other
  essential nutrients as whole milk, but fewer calories
  and less saturated fat.
- Make Half Your Grains Whole Grains
   To eat more whole grains, substitute a whole-grain product for a refined product—such as eating whole wheat bread instead of white bread or brown rice instead of white rice.
- 8. Foods To Eat Less Often
  Cut back on foods high in solid fats, added sugars,
  and salt. They include cakes, cookies, ice cream,
  candies, sweetened drinks, pizza, and fatty meats
  like ribs, sausages, bacon, and hot dogs. Use these
  foods as occasional treats, not everyday foods.
- 9. Compare Sodium In Foods
  Use the Nutrition Facts label to choose lower sodium
  versions of foods like soup, bread, and frozen meals.
  Select canned foods labeled "low sodium," "reduced
  sodium," or "no salt added."
- 10. Drink Water Instead Of Sugary Drinks Cut calories by drinking water or unsweetened beverages. Soda, energy drinks, and sports drinks are a major source of added sugar, and calories, in American diets.
