Total Educational Experience: For Our Kids, Community

Earlier this month, the Board of Education voted to approve an operational referendum. The question will go before district residents on February 16, 2021.

OPERATIONAL

This referendum is focused on meeting the ongoing and increasing operational needs of the District. As we seek to continue providing students with a total educational experience, programs and courses, resources and supplies, as well as technology and teachers are needed at all levels, from SCCC to Grade 12. And in all areas, from academics to athletics, from fine-arts to co-curriculars; from general education to special education to summer education.

The question on the ballot will ask voters to consider a three-year, non-recurring referendum to exceed the revenue limit for \$1,525,000 in 2021-2022, \$1,700,000 in 2022-2023, and \$1,875,000 in 2023-2024 to finance ongoing operational expenses necessary to maintain the educational programs of the district. This referendum is similar to that which was brought before the voters in February 2018.

MILL RATE

For the past three years, we have been operating with a deficit budget. Annually, the budget approved has included a projected draw upon the Fund Balance between \$480,000 and \$800,000. This was due, in large part, to changes in funding from the State, but also because of an underestimation of expenditures necessary to support our programs and the related growth we have seen in student needs and interests, including desired skills for the workplace. As a result, the mill rate hovered around the \$10.00 mark for the past three years.

The mill rate projected for the next three years with an affirmative vote on February 16, would see a bit of an increase from the past three years. Under the proposed referenda, the mill rates for the next three years would be \$10.09, \$10.13, and \$10.25, which includes an average of \$0.69 annually for the multi-purpose facility. If approved, voters will see mill rates continue to hover around the six-year average of \$10.17.

NEWS FROM GRADES 7-12 OFFICE

Dear Member of our Shiocton Community,

This is Mr. Ortlieb, the 7th-12th grade principal, and I am excited to bring you news about some happenings in the middle school and high school here in Shiocton. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the School Board of the above named School District, at a meeting duly called, noticed, held and conducted on December 7, 2020, adopted an Initial Resolution:

INITIAL RESOLUTION

AUTHORIZING THE SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET TO EXCEED REVENUE LIMITS IN AN AMOUNT
NOT TO EXCEED \$5,100,000

Said initial Resolution was adopted pursuant to the provisions of Wisconsin Statute 121.91 to authorize exceeding the revenue limit by \$5,100,000 for the following amounts in the school years specified: \$1,525,000 in 2021-2022; \$1,700,000 in 2022-2023; \$1,875,000 in 2023-2024, for non-recurring purposes; such excess to be used to finance ongoing operational expenses necessary to maintain current educational programs of the District.

A copy of the Initial Resolution is on file in the District Office located at N5650 Broad Street, Shiocton, Wisconsin, 54170 and may be inspected weekdays, except holidays, between the hours of 7:00AM and 4:00PM.

The School Board has called for a referendum election on the Initial Resolution to be held on February 16, 2021.

I hope you all had an amazing winter break! As we return to school and remain "IN PERSON" I want to commend you all for the hard work you have been doing. We do not take for granted the extra effort made by all families to keep us learning in person.

As for new stuff, the COVID-19 vaccine is being administered to people as you are reading this. For up-to-date information on how the vaccine is being distributed please go to <https://www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/covid-19/vaccine-about.htm>. This website is frequently updated to provide the latest and greatest information regarding the administration of the vaccination in the state of Wisconsin. Due to the initial limited supply of the vaccine, the federal Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) and the [State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee \(SDMAC\)](#) developed [Wisconsin-specific recommendations](#) on vaccine prioritization. Based on these phase 1a recommendations from federal and state health experts, the first populations to receive the vaccine will be frontline healthcare workers and residents of long-term care facilities.

As supply increases, recommendations will likely expand to cover other essential workers, people ages 65 and older, and people at increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19 to receive a vaccine. Later, as more supply becomes available, groups of people at higher risk for contracting COVID-19 and the general public will be recommended to get vaccines.



DENTAL CLINIC

On Tuesday, February 9th, the Tri-County Dental Clinic will come to Shiocton Elementary school to offer a free dental screening and fluoride varnish to qualifying students. The qualification for participation in this program is that the student receives free or reduced cost hot lunch, and does NOT have private dental insurance. It is available for all students in PK-6th grade. This largely volunteer-driven nonprofit clinic focuses on prevention and early intervention with youngsters who have limited access or whose families cannot afford dental care. The first phase of this program takes place at school with subsequent treatment either at school or at Tri-County Community Dental Clinic. All services are offered free of charge including dental cleaning and any restorative treatment a child may require. If you wish to have your child participate and they meet the qualifications, please complete the forms your child brought home and return to school. VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot. A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the election. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot by mail or in person.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail.

The deadline for making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail is:
5:00 pm on Thursday, February 11, 2021.

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Voting an absentee ballot in person.

You may also request and vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office or other specified location during the days and hours specified for casting an absentee ballot in person.

The last date to vote an absentee ballot in the clerk's office is Friday, February 12, 2021.

No in-person absentee voting may occur on a weekend or legal holiday.

The municipal clerk will deliver voted ballots returned on or before Election Day to the proper polling place or counting location before the polls close on February 16, 2021. Any ballots received after the polls close will not be counted.
