NEWS FROM GRADES 7-12 OFFICE

Dear Members of our Shiocton School Community,

This is Nick Ortlieb, the 7th - 12th grade principal. I am excited to bring you some news about what is happening in the coming days at our middle school and high school. The first half of the year has gone quickly, and our staff is looking forward to the second semester. Our school district has done its utmost to provide a quality educational experience for our students, and we will look to continue that through the end of the school year.

There are a few things that I would like to inform parents about that are coming up in January. First, we have begun the scheduling process for the 2023-2024 school year for next year's high school students. Our school counselor, Mrs. Cornell, met with students in Grades 8 through 11 to discuss their interests and what classes they should take to help meet their career goals. We will be doing the official course registration

during our semester exam days, which are coming up on January 16 and 17, 2023.

In addition to this important event, we have some other important upcoming dates. Students will be back in session from winter break on January 3. Seniors will be taking part in our Reality Check simulation on January 6. There is no school on January 18 in preparation for the start of second semester. Monday, February 20, is a Professional Development day for staff, so students will have that day off. We also have testing season coming up in the 2nd half of the year for middle school and high school students, so pay attention to information related to ACT, Pre-ACT and Forward testing in the months to come. Parents and/or Guardians,

Next year, your child will be able to participate in an exciting computer science class in Shiocton High School, offered as part of our partnership with TEALS (Technology Education and Literacy in Schools). Through the TEALS partnership, trained volunteers from the technology industry will join Mr. Griesbach's classroom to help teach computer science. The computer Science classes at Shiocton High School are eligible for student to earn elective math credit.

Computing has changed the world in profound ways: it has opened wonderful new ways for people to connect, design, research, play, create, and express themselves. In today's world, it's important for your child to go beyond using computers and smart phones and learn how to solve problems by using technology and writing computer programs. These skills and mindsets will help prepare your child for many possible career paths – not just the tech industry. The website www.careerswithcode.com showcases how computer science can lead to amazing opportunities in the areas of art, business, music, medicine, sports, agriculture, gaming, and more.

This survey course offers students a hands-on introduction to computer science. Students will program using a block-based graphical interface as they learn how to translate their ideas into computer programs ("coding"). Students will learn about big ideas in computing such as abstraction and design and will explore various aspects of computing relevant to themselves and to society.

As mentioned above, through the TEALS program, volunteers from the tech industry will participate in this class. Read their short biographies below to learn about these wonderful individuals and how they will help bring their real-world knowledge to our classroom:

- Ameena Lalani is a Senior Cloud Solution Architect at Microsoft. She is based in Chicago. Her specialty is Microsoft SQL Server Product. This is her second year as a TEAL's volunteer. Ameena runs a SQL Server user group which meets monthly to listen to speakers who are data professionals in their fields. In her free time, Ameena likes to paint, listen to audiobooks, walk, and meditate.
- Hannah Taubenfeld is a Product Manager at Microsoft. She is currently based in their Redmond office in Washington and lives in Seattle. Her specialty is hardware and operating systems. Hannah majored in Electrical and Computer Engineering and Computer Science at Duke University and began volunteering with TEAL's this year. Hannah is also an avid reader and enjoys basketball.

Students are using multiple sources to write about a famous athlete or artist. They will be detailing the person's childhood, adult life, accomplishments, and a timeline of important events. Fourth graders are also wrapping up their expository essays and will start persuasive writing next.

In math, we've finished our unit on multi-digit multiplication and have been persevering through long division. Daily multiplication fact practice is helping us master these algorithms. Next up, equations and word problems.

Students have been learning about the history of Wisconsin and our journey to Statehood in Social Studies. In Science, students are discovering how to create circuits to power a light bulb, and have learned the differences between weathering, erosion, and deposition and how this contributes to the rock cycle.

We enjoyed the opportunity to play in the first snowfall of the year! We're looking forward to a few more weeks of fun before winter break.

GRADE 2

January is a time to unwind and relax after all the hustle and bustle of the holidays. Take time to find a good book to read with your second grader. Snuggle up in the warmth of your house to read it together, maybe with a little hot chocolate! Although your child is becoming an independent reader, he/she still enjoys being read to!

In math, second graders are learning about different methods to subtract two-digit numbers. They will be counting collections of quarters, dimes, nickels, and pennies, as well. Take some time to practice counting with real coins at home. That extra practice is so beneficial.

Our second graders are also enjoying some really great read-aloud stories in class. The lessons are interactive, which means the students have the opportunity for some rich discussions. Miles Oleson, Reed Ritchie, and Maria Nelson shared their experiences from their October trip to Camp U-Nah-Li-Ya. A favorite trip often recounted in graduation speeches, the three students regaled the Coffee with Community attendees with stories about their adventures climbing the rock wall,



having fun in "the pit", singing songs around the fire, and watching for Ole Peterson to magically appear while canoeing. Reed was good to remind us about the perils of movement when in a canoe, noting that he learned "not to lean in a canoe or you'll fall". A fall that could well find you wet and in the water! Passing off the Gizmo without being caught continues to be a highlight of the three-day and two-night adventure. All three students recommended continuing with the long-standing tradition noting how much fun they had but also how much they learned. "It's ok to fail and ask for help," noted Maria, the likes of which was echoed by Miles, "It's ok to keep trying because if you don't try, you'll never accomplish anything."

WHEN SHOULD I KEEP MY CHILD HOME?

With the increase in illnesses it is hard to know when to keep your child home from school. Generally, children who are ill do not belong at school. The following guidelines are suggestions to assist parents in determining when to keep their child home or when they will be sent home from school:

Fever: Usually the first warning that something is not right with the body. A child with a temperature over 100 degrees should NOT be sent to school. Your child may return to school once they are fever free for 24 hours without fever reducing medication.

Vomiting/Diarrhea: Should be kept home for at least 24 hours after the last episode to allow the body time to recuperate. Call your doctor if prompt improvement does not occur to avoid dehydration.

Pink Eye: Student will be sent home if suspected pink eye (Pink/Red, itchy, or crusty eyes). Medical treatment is required. Must be on treatment for 24 hours before returning to school.

Ear Pain: Consult your doctor for evaluation. Ok to be at school as long as no fever is present and student is in good spirits. If pain is affecting the child's ability to concentrate in class, student will be sent home.

Cough: If a child has a deep, frequent, or persistent cough they should stay home. If your child has a cough with a fever or wheezing, you should contact your doctor immediately.

Strep Throat: Student will be sent home if strep throat is suspected (Fever, sore throat with white spots present). Medical treatment is required. Must be on treatment for 24 hours before returning to school.

Headache: Ok to be at school if they are in good spirits. If pain is affecting the child's ability to concentrate in class, student will be sent home.

Rash: This may be the first sign of one of the many childhood illnesses. Ex: Chicken pox, measles, impetigo. Do not send your child to school with a rash. Consult your child's doctor prior to sending back to school to ensure they are not contagious.

Head Lice or Nits: Students with head lice or nits need to remain home until treated per policy. Please contact the school nurse to make a plan for returning.

COVID-19: Children must stay home from school until they are 24 hours fever free without the use of a fever reducing agent.

The single most effective way to prevent the spread of infection is through proper handwashing. Please encourage your children to practice safe, proper hand hygiene.

Protecting Library Books

Winter is here and the snowflakes are flying. We want to remind everyone to please protect the library books that go home. Wet items such as snow pants, boots, hats and mittens can all cause water damage to a book. Please encourage students to leave a plastic bag in their backpack to put their library books in for more protection. If a book does get wet and has damage to it, a fine will be assessed.

Outstanding Fines

The library is working hard to make it convenient for parents to pay library fines. Currently fines must be paid in the LMC by cash or check. We are working with IT to get fines to sync with Skyward so they may be paid online. We are hoping to have this set up for the start of second semester.

New Procedure for Long Overdue Books

Currently, overdue notices are automatically emailed to middle and high school students every Monday morning and elementary students are reminded about overdue books during their weekly visits to the library. However, we still have over a hundred overdue items every day and many of those books have been overdue for some time. Starting second semester, the library will be rolling out a new procedure for long overdue books. If a student fails to return their book within one month after its due date, Destiny will automatically mark this book as lost and a fine will be assessed. If the book is returned in good condition, the fine will be removed from the student's account. We want to ensure that books are being returned on a timely basis so that others have the opportunity to check them out.

Scripps Spelling Bee

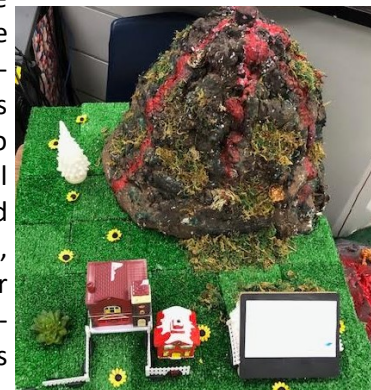

VOLCANOES

Recently, the 8th grade science classes culminated their study of volcanoes with a fun activity; each student created their own volcano. Mrs. Ludick suggested different materials they could use to make their volcanoes, different ways they could erupt them, and a variety of themes their volcanoes could display. Over the course of two weeks, students constructed their volcanoes at home.



On December 1, all the volcanoes were brought in and displayed. Volcanoes of every color made of spray foam, paper mache, and other materials filled the counters and floor in Mrs. Ludick's room. A wide variety of themes appeared such as beach, snow, cars, dinosaurs, and much more. One student, Bellah Young, created a 5-foot pink spray foam candy themed volcano. Bellah's volcano broke the record for the tallest volcano ever made for that assignment. During the 7th and 8th hour science classes, the students gathered outside to erupt their volcanoes. Depending on the method a student chose for eruption, the volcano would erupt in different ways. If a student chose the "baking soda and vinegar method," the eruption would fizzle down the sides. However, if a student chose the "soda and mentos method," the eruption would be explosive. Eruption after eruption, students watched to see whose volcano would go the highest, or how well their friend's volcanoes would erupt. After all of the fun was over, the students dumped the vinegar or soda soaked volcanoes into the garbage bins making great memories for years to come.



BOOK TASTING

The seventh and eighth graders were treated to a book tasting event in the library as part of their ELA class. They sampled books selected from five different genres. They wrote about the books in their menus so they would have a record to reference when they are looking for a book to check out and read in the future.
