




Shiocton Athlete Commits to Division 1 School

Ava goes in depth on her decision to commit to Green Bay. Dear Members of our Shiocton School Community,

This is Mr. Nick Ortlieb, bringing you some updates from the Middle School/High School Office. The first half of the year has gone by in the blink of an eye and we are already approaching the end of our 1st semester. Our school district has done a phenomenal job of meeting our students' academic needs, and I remain proud to be part of a school staff that cares so deeply about its students. We look forward to continuing on the positive momentum that we have built thus far this school year.

There are a few things that I want to make sure parents are aware of as we kick off January. First, we have begun the scheduling process for the 2024-2025 school year for next year's high school students. Our school counselor, Mrs. Cornell, has had the chance to meet with students in grades 8 through 11 on what their class selections will look like based on their anticipated career paths and interests. We will be doing the official course registration during our semester exam days, which are coming up on January 15th and 16th.

In addition to registration/course selection, we have some other important upcoming dates. Students will return from Winter Break on January 2, 2024. We hope that they are refreshed and ready to take on the second half of the school year. Our 12th grade students will be taking part in our Reality Check simulation on January 5, 2024. This activity is a budget simulation which asks our senior students to go through several real-life scenarios. It is a great way to help them prepare for life after high school. On this date, we will also be doing our 2nd ACT Practice test with 9th -11th grade students. We will not have school on January 17, 2024, as that is a Professional Development day for staff. All of our middle school and high school parents should also keep an eye out for information related to state testing. The ACT, Pre-ACT and Forward tests will be coming up in the spring. If you have any questions, please reach out.

On the legacy she left on the Shiocton High School Cross Country program, "I would say that I left a pretty good impression on all of the current cross country athletes. I was someone who my teammates looked up to, and I motivated them to work hard so that they can get better. One of my teammates told me that they want to go to state in the future, and I was glad I could be an inspiration to them to work hard to accomplish big things. It is definitely hard to be leaving the cross country program, but I was so glad I could do big things for the program and hopefully inspire others to join cross country." Ava is looking to make an instant impact as a freshman next year. "The races in college are a 6K distance compared to the 5K distance we race in high school, so I have some different goals than I would normally have for the 5K. My first year I would like to be competing injury free, and hopefully have worked hard enough to be one of the top five runners on the team. Since Green Bay is Division I, competition will be very challenging, so I definitely won't be a stand out runner. My main goals are just to train hard and smart, keep injuries away, and help my team place well."

Coach's Perspective

After Ava's commitment to UWGB, her head coach, Michael Isbel describes her legacy as "hard work". "Ava finishing in the top three every meet and 15th at state certainly gives every Shiocton runner after her a goal to aim for. But, I think her greater legacy is the hard work she put in during the off season. Not only did our own athletes wonder how she made such an improvement over last year, but athletes and coaches from other schools were asking the same questions." Coach Isbel, on what he will remember most about this season commented, "Ava's performances were always fun to watch. But, then again, so were everyone else's. More importantly, cross-country, and distance running in general, is a microcosm of life. It takes time. The terrain is changing. The race can start out great and deteriorate rapidly or go the other way around. Only the individual runner can decide how they will adapt. I was privileged to watch my runners adapt, grow and finish well." Finally, on what it was like to coach such a great athlete like Ava. "Ava has been very easy to coach. She did every workout without complaining and often asked for more work."

Next Up

Ava will continue her offseason training and looks forward to competing in track this spring. During the offseason, Ava along with a few of her teammates plan to participate in various running competitions, including the one most recently held at UW-Milwaukee. Ava and her Phoenix teammates will kick off their cross country season in September 2024.

Gage's Gauge: Winter Sports

As we are at the midpoint of the winter sports season, we take a look at how each team has performed thus far and what they will look to accomplish the rest of the year.

Wrestling

After having their most successful season in program history a year ago, the Shiocton wrestling program will have lofty expectations heading into their 23-24 campaign. With a current record of 3-6, their only losses have come against teams ranked in the top five in their division. The Chiefs were able to finish 8th out of 32 teams in the Dells Duels and have a win over #4 Cumberland. Of the players who have stood out this year, Head Coach Dom Gunderson mentioned Mason Demerath, Jordan Jahnke, Izaiah Sanchez, Ilijah Sanchez, Lexi Riehl, and Holdyn Volkman. Coach Gunderson also mentioned the players who have stepped up this season. "Holdyn has competed really well. We knew he had it in him, and he's not really (feeling) well. Aubrey Hess and Stevie Baker have also competed really well by picking up a lot of wins." Gunderson also mentioned that this year's team features a younger group than in years past. They have played a very tough schedule, but have done really well and the team is developing nicely. On what the team is looking to accomplish the rest of the season, Coach Gunderson alluded to "Winning every day, having discipline to do our job when it's hard. If we do that, we'll have a lot of success in the short term. Our long-term goal is reaching Team State and qualifying eight (8) individual State wrestlers.'

The girls wrestling team has already won more meets than last season. The boys team is getting better each week as Blake Carton picked up his

100th career win. Make sure to see catch the Chiefs in action on the mats to see if they can sustain this success the rest of the season.

High School Boys Basketball

After opening the season with a record of 2-4 (1-1), the Chiefs know they have so much potential left to show. "All five starters have shown a lot this year," said Head Coach Chad Schmidt. "They're all growing together, taking their turns with some quality contributions." He also mentioned how they're playing hard, knocking down shots, sharing the ball, and showing great defensive intensity. Coach Schmidt also noted how they are growing on the offensive side of the ball with their "equal opportunity offense". "[We've] shown some really good things on both sides of the floor as we've tried to establish an equal opportunity offense - the guy who gets the best look takes the shot, trying to make that extra pass." The Chiefs are committed to getting better every day the rest of this season. "Have a good experience. Continue on the process of being the best we can be and enjoy the experience of playing basketball together."

Be on the lookout to see if the Chiefs can repeat as conference champions this season.

High School Girls Basketball

The Shiocton girls basketball team sits with a current record of 2-7 (1-3). Head Coach Eric Schmidt mentioned his seniors have been standing out on the team, something expected heading into this year. "Alexis Garcia is doing a great job of running as the point guard and is leading the

team in scoring with 11.5 pointers per game (ppg). Autumn Taylor is averaging just under 8 ppg and leads the team with 9.5 rebounds per game. Sydney Ritchie is contributing on all levels by averaging just over 8 ppg, 8.5 rebounds per game and leads the team with just over 2.5 steals per game." He also mentioned sophomore Aliyah Reese as someone who has adapted to the varsity level very quickly and at times has been able to take over games.

Coach Schmidt also mentioned that though the wins have not come as they would've liked, the team is still getting better and battling every night. "We are learning how to play individually and learning how to play as a team. All of our games but two have been single digit games. We have competed in all of our games and we scheduled a difficult schedule to start the season. Our conference is very competitive and each game was a battle. But I believe those games have created a better team and have learned a lot through those games."

On what the Chiefs are looking to achieve for the rest of the season, "we are looking to see how this team comes together and play as a team. I know we have it in us, sometimes it just takes more time. We see signs that this team is starting to understand how we need to play as a team and commit to the process. I fully believe this team will continue to grow and get better. The coaching staff has lofty goals for this team and we will continue to work to achieve those goals."

With a veteran lead team this season, the Chiefs are only just scratching the surface of their potential. Be sure to make plans to be in the stands to cheer on the Chiefs.

Capital Campaign 2024: Building Their Future Five Projects. Playground Needs Lead to Referendum

Referendum funds would be spent to replace main electrical service equipment 20 electrical panel boards that were install prior to 1996. As well as 6 roof top air handling units plus aging water and sewer piping, boilers, roofs, and variable frequency drives from 1996. The current electrical service has reached maximum capacity, limiting the equipment that can be utilized in our classrooms, especially those associated with Tech Ed instruction.



Referendum funds would be spent to remodel and expand the current Technical Education learning area. New space would be added on to the current building to provide for a dedicated woodshop and three-bay transportation shop, as well as a tool room, finishing room, classroom, storage, and offices. A courtyard would be built adjacent to the remodeled and expanded construction trades room. A portion of the current structure would also be remodel to provide a dedicated metals shop with new welding bays, as well as a formal


> Referendum funds would be spent to construct a new wing for the Shiocton Child Care Center. The Center now enrolls nearly 100 children, ages 6 weeks of age to 10 years old, and offers before- and after-school care, as well as all-day care. The wing would include an office adjacent to the secured entrance to the elementary school, as well as six classrooms and meeting space. The funds would also provide for the remodel of five elementary classrooms.



Referendum funds have also been earmarked for the replacement of our current playground equipment and repaving of the playground surface area. The current unit, which is estimated to be 25+ years old, is showing its age with worn-out necks and connectors, as well as several key components with spots wearing and rusting through. Play structures, painted in school colors of green and white, similar to the one shown would be installed prior to laying new asphalt around the playground.



Referendum funds would be spent to construct a new fine arts wing and school gymnasium. The fine arts wing will bring the band and choir instructional areas together, providing for improved acoustics in larger classrooms, as well as practice rooms and storage. The gymnasium area would also include a dedicated entrance area comprised of a concession stand, bathrooms, and lobby. The funds would also provide for the remodeling of existing spaces to create four new locker rooms, trainer's room, laundry room, coaches' offices, and storage.
