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MWA HOMETOWN HERO: AMY AUSTIN, SCHOOL NURSE

Earlier this month, Mrs. Amy Austin, RN/ School Nurse, was recognized by the Modern Woodmen of America (MWA) as their 2022 Hometown Hero. This recognition was established to honor someone who makes a positive impact on their community.

"Mrs. Austin was selected for the award because of her efforts in guiding our school through the COVID pandemic," noted Mr. Michael Bellin, Activities Coordinator for MWA. "Without (her) efforts, (the district) would not have been able to serve our students by having in-person learning while other schools remained closed. In years to come, our students will show benefits from not having to learn remotely."

Under Mrs. Austin's leadership, the school district was able to maintain inperson learning for all students in all grades every day of the 2020-2021 school year, and again in 2021-2022 as the Delta and Omicron variants threatened to keep students in a virtual learning environment for a second year.

"Initially, I was shocked and certainly honored. To me, I was just doing the job I was supposed to do," commented Mrs. Austin. "I was shocked when I learned of the recognition because you don't expect to be recognized for just doing the job you were trained to do. I'm also very honored. We have an amazing district and an amazing community. Everyone came together (during the pandemic) and we all did what we needed to keep everyone healthy and safe. To be recognized for my role is truly an honor."

Mrs. Austin reflects positively on her first year as a school nurse. "Becoming the school nurse during the pandemic required many hours of hard work and prioritizing of tasks. Each day was a balancing act between what we were hearing from officials and what we were seeing in our schools. Lifting and applying restrictions was difficult but necessary to keep everyone safe and healthy but also keep the kids and staff here, happy, and in as "normal" of a day as possible."

"This (2020-2021) was not an easy school year to be a school nurse, let alone a school nurse for the first time" commented Mrs. Schweitzer, District Administrator. "However, Mrs. Austin rose to the occasion quickly and effortlessly. She collaborated often at the local, county, and state level to ensure her information was accurate. Mrs. Austin's recommendations for action were wellthought-out, balancing the many recommendations with the data we were collecting, and further balancing the academic and mental health of students with the health and safety of all staff and students."

This is Nick Ortlieb, the 7th-12th grade Principal, and I am excited to fill all of you in on some of the great things that are happening here at Shiocton Middle School and High School. The year has been off to a great start, and we hope to continue it through the 2nd Quarter. We have, thankfully, been able to return to normal school operations and put the pandemic largely behind us. I look forward to the excitement that the rest of the year will bring us.

We have a lot of focus points as we have moved through the year. Firstly, we are continuing to refine our Response to Intervention programs. We have two new staff members who are leading the charge, our Reading Interventionist Ms. Flohr, and our new school psychologist, Mrs. Rice. We will continue with 10th grade and 11th grade through November and December.

There are also some important upcoming dates. The end of Quarter 1 is coming up on November 2, which will be an early release day. We will also have our annual Veterans' Day program in our high school gym on November 11th. Students will have an early release day on November 23rd for the Thanksgiving Holiday. This is a great time for students to reflect on the start of the year and get some much needed rest. GRADE 2

Second grade is filled with budding authors. The students have been busy writing "small moment" stories during Writer's Workshop each day. They have been working on generating ideas and writing stories with interesting beginnings and strong endings that do not leave their readers hanging. They



have been experimenting with bringing their characters to life with action, talk, and details, as well as choosing strong and precise words to help their readers visualize. Our second graders have carried over what they learned in first grade as authors and continue to grow as second grade writers!

In math, we have been learning and practicing strategies to add numbers up to 200. Students are using vocabulary such as 'quick tens' and 'quick hundreds'. We are also exploring the many methods to add two-digit numbers. Our math dry erase boards are getting a lot of use lately making proof drawings to help the students show and explain their thinking to partners.

Your second grader should be well into a nightly routine that involves reading and math homework. Homework is an important way for parents to review what is being taught and practice skills to help their child be successful. 


VETERANS DAY BREAKFAST

We hope to see all of our local veterans!








DECORATING WITH DIVERSITY

On October 12, many students from the high school technical education department traveled to the Sunny View Expo Center in Oshkosh for the Construction Trades Career Day. Overall, this trip was a great opportunity for us to see all of the businesses and different trade opportunities available to us.

All of the different businesses showed us a variety of different jobs that are available through the trades. Representatives shared information about job duties, employment, and apprenticeship programs. Additionally, there were many interactive learning activities including jackhammering concrete, brick laying, tile cutting and laying, soldering copper pipe, carpentry, and sheet metal working. The simulators that were provided for us were especially interesting. My favorite were two welding simulators in which we could drive excavators like they were video games while also digging holes. These

activities opened our eyes about what we could potentially do in the future.

After stopping for a quick lunch, we headed to Agristeel. On the tour, we saw the planning side of building things and the effort that is involved before the workers even start pouring concrete. In addition, we were able to view the process of preparing the steel for building. Our guide provided us ample opportunity to ask many questions to better understand the process of preparing steel. Next, we were able to practice welding by doing a quick weld on two pieces of steel, simulating what the welders do all day, which was both informative and fun.




Schald Notes from the Nurse

Tis the season for runny noses, sore throats and coughs! This note serves as a reminder that per the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction Medication Policy, all **cough drops** that have substances in them used to treat or prevent health conditions *require the written consent of the child's parent/guardian*.

Cough drops brought to school need to be in the original bag/ container and the child's name must be written on it. Since cough drops are considered a form of medication, they must be brought in by the child's parent/guardian. Any cough drops put in a child's backpack without written consent will not be administered to the child.

Why, you may ask? They are just cough drops! Children are taught to share; it is the kind thing to do! But some cough drops contain medication/sugar in them and sharing them might harm other students with certain medical conditions. Also, a small child should be monitored by an adult when using a cough drop, as they can be a choking hazard.
