Dear Shiocton Community Members,

Greetings from the Shiocton 7th-12th Grade office. I am glad to be able to tell all of you about the great things that are happening in our school district. We are lucky to still be able to educate our students in person, and we are thrilled to be able to come up with ways to make this year feel closer to normal. I am excited to give all of you some updates on our upcoming events here in the district.

As we edge closer to the middle of 3rd Quarter, testing season is upon us. First up is the ACT with Writing for our Junior class. As you may know, all Juniors in Wisconsin are required to take the ACT with Writing in Spring. Juniors, including those who chose our virtual option at semester, will be taking the ACT on March 9th right here in our High School. If you have a student that is a Junior, make sure to talk to them about good study habits, getting enough sleep, and eating well as we approach the test. Later on in the year, we will have our 7th, 8th, and 10th grade students take part in the Forward Exam. The ACT Aspire will also take place during 4th quarter and will test our 9th and 10th grade students. More information on those tests will come out as we get closer to the end of the year.

I would also like to inform you about a few other events that are coming up. On March 3, 2021, we will be hosting our Spring Parent/Teacher Conferences. They will be held virtually, similar to how they were done in the fall. If you are unable to sign up for a timeslot, please contact your child's teacher to set up a time to talk. The end of our 3rd Quarter takes place on March 26, 2021. After that, we will enjoy a week long Spring Break, which runs from March 27-April 4, 2021. Students will return from break on April 5, 2021. FOUR-AND-FIVE YEAR OLD KINDERGARTEN ENROLLMENT FOR 2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR

The Shiocton School District will be holding four and five-year-old kindergarten enrollment the week of **March 1-5, 2021** between 7:30AM and 4:00PM. For four-year-old kindergarten, enrollment packets will be mailed home in mid-February to parents/guardians whose children are eligible for the program. For five-year-old kindergarten, enrollment packets will be given to all students currently enrolled in the four-year-old program. Parents/guardians are asked to contact the elementary office at (920) 986-3351 ext. 721 to request an enrollment packet if they do not receive one or if their child is not currently enrolled in the four-year-old program.

The forms within the packets are to be filled out and dropped off in the elementary office between the hours of 7:30AM and 4:00PM during the enrollment week. Enrollment will only take a few minutes. Parents are asked to bring their child's birth certificate on that date. It is not necessary for the child to be present.

Parents/guardians will finish the remainder of the full registration process online in August with all of the other grade levels.

Four-Year-Old Kindergarten: The four-year-old program is an optional program. Registration is open to all children in the district who will be four years old on or before September 1, 2021. Students in the program meet for 2 full days each week.

Five-Year-Old Kindergarten: To be eligible for this program, a child must be five years old on or before September 1, 2021. Students in this program meet for five full days each week.

Orientation: An orientation will be offered in the spring. Watch for more details in the near future.

WHAT TIME IS IT IN 2ND GRADE?

That is a question being asked by many of our second graders this month. Our students are busy learning about time on both analog and digital clocks. We are also working on distinguishing between AM and PM times. This month we will also be busy in math working on describing, organizing, and representing data in graphs.



In our Writer's Workshop, students have been learning about how to write and share out opinions. Students have written opinion pieces on what they think the best animal is, book, restaurant, or game. Our students are also learning that if they write a really strong opinion piece, it may change someone else's opinion on the topic. For example, their opinion piece might be that they should have a later bedtime or be able to chew gum in school. They are quickly learning that being able to form a logical argument for their opinion is a useful skill to have.

It's time for March Madness in 2nd grade! In each Grade 2 class, we are holding a March Madness Tournament for our daily class read alouds this month to see which read aloud is the fan favorite. Each day we will read aloud a class favorite and they will vote whether that book continues in the tournament or if it gets knocked out by a different book. Books such as *No David*, *The Mitten*, and *Goodnight Moon* are just a few of the fun read alouds we will be doing. We are excited to see which books the students vote into the finals of our own March Madness Tournament and which book comes out victorious!

Fourth graders have hit the ground running in 3rd quarter! 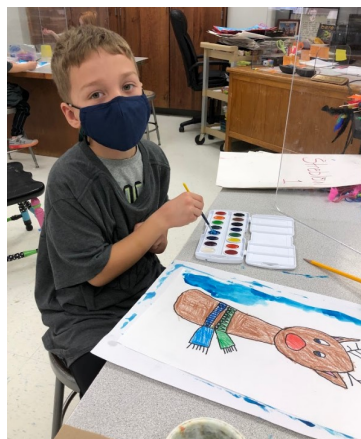

EISCH CABINET'S MAILBOX PROJECT

Amidst COVID-19, quarantine, and calendar struggles, Shiocton students and Eisch Cabinets were finally able to work together to complete a project that spanned multiple school years. Starting more than a year and a half ago, a cooperative learning project to replace the mailboxes and cabinets in the high school/middle school office began with the students in Shiocton and Jim Eisch and his company. The intention was to have a hands-on and practical learning project where students were able to learn and work together to see how a commercial cabinet project progresses from start to finish. After an enormous amount of rescheduling and sidestepping adversity, the project reached its culmination at the end of last semester.



There were many steps of this project. Early in the project Jim and a few of his staff came to Shiocton to meet with our staff to determine the needs of the final product, meet with students to measure and establish dimensions and criteria, and to demonstrate and work with students to generate plans for new cabinets for the office. Students had the opportunity to see how to size up a project and design custom cabinets.

Last spring, students took a field trip to Eisch Cabinets in Freedom to see the completed cabinet designs and to witness how the plans transformed from drawings into a materials list, then a parts list, and move onto the production floor. Students learned about CNC manufacturing, robotics, automation, material handling, staffing and business applications for small businesses. Students were also able to learn about process improvement while aiding in the construction of actual cabinet parts and pieces to be used in the school office. Finally, the group was able to assist in the assembly of the final products to be installed while gaining a deeper understanding of time management and the number of careers included in a cabinet making shop.

COVID slowed the pace of the project last spring but in the fall, Eisch Cabinets were able to find time to work hand in hand with Mr. Bergstresor's Cabinet Making class to install the newly made products. Working with and witnessing the skilled craftsmen was a tremendous experience for the students as they now know why not everyone can simply build and install cabinets. Also, the students are now able to walk into the high school office and say, "I helped design, build, and install those cabinets." We would specifically like to thank Jim Eisch and his staff for donating the entire project to Shiocton schools. Their generosity is greatly appreciated.

Notes from the Nurse

We started the month of February as the School District of Shiocton was able to celebrate 100 days of in-person learning in the month of February during a pandemic! First of all, this could not have been accomplished without the help of all of you. Your honesty in reporting illness has been a huge factor and keeping your kids home when they are sick is of utmost importance.

A reminder that the signs and symptoms of COVID that seem to be presenting in children mimic a common cold a majority of the time. When you call your child in for signs and symptoms of a cold and have any questions regarding whether or not the school recommends testing please have the office forward your call to myself and we can discuss a plan to get your child back to school safely. Absences related to COVID must go through the nurse to be excused as a COVID absence. Your child will be sent home if they have signs of symptoms of COVID if they come to school ill without discussing symptoms with the nurse first. Students will also be sent home if they receive medication prior to the school day to suppress signs and symptoms of COVID as well.

Also, a reminder to have your children bring a mask from home every single day. Here are a few reminders regarding the care of masks:

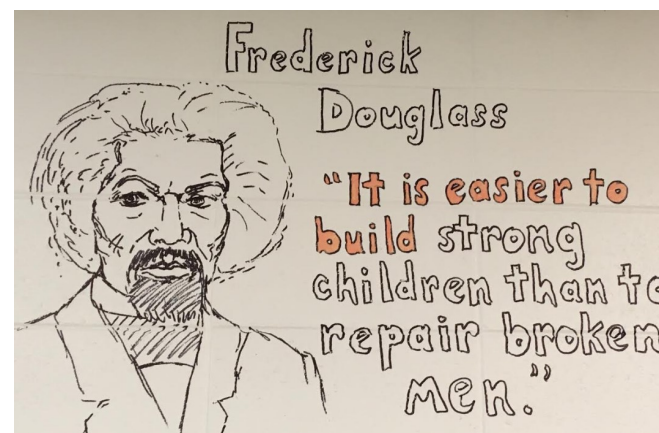
- They should fit snugly but comfortably on the side of the face

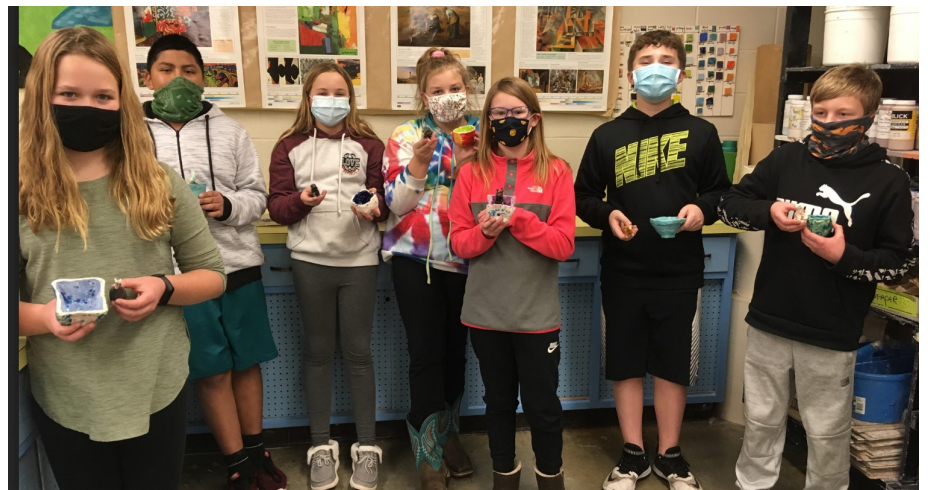
