Rolling to the Bus Stop One Last Time

Fieldings call an end to 51 years of bus driving

After 51 years and 1,270,920 miles on the road, Gene and Janice Fielding have parked the bus for the final time, ending an amazing career. This all started back when Gene moved from New London to Shiocton in 1966. In that same year Gene's father, Charlie Fielding, purchased buses and began driving for the School District of Shiocton. Shortly after, Gene acquired his bus license. In 1971, Gene purchased his first bus from Don Little. At this point, Gene officially began driving as the second generation of Fielding's in the bussing career. Years down the road, Gene's father would retire, leaving Gene and Janice with two more bus routes in 1990. The Fielding's have been driving around 70 miles a day for the last 51 years for Shiocton, traveling over 2.5 million miles in daily routes alone.

When asked how fast it went by, Gene commented, "it feels like it was just yesterday". "It was really cool to be able to see the kids grow up." Their greatest accomplishment was not having any accidents, which is remarkable considering they've been driving for 102 years combined. "Safety is the highest priority; getting the kids home safe". Although there were some close calls, their prior driving experience paid dividends in getting the kids home safe. Janice grew up on a farm, hauling cabbage to the kraut factory, while Gene had been driving semi for 15 years. These experiences taught them many lessons on how to be safe on the roads. For instance, Janice learned you "don't take the corners too sharp". When she was just 11 years old, Janice took a turn too sharp and had the trailer roll over the tire. For Gene, he was able to tell if a car had it breaks on just by looking at it. At the end of the day, having this type of experience was paramount to getting the kids home safely. So, what kept them going for 51 years? Just being able to do what they love. "It's a family-oriented job

with a good paycheck and flexibility. With having work to do on the farm, it's really nice to be able to only drive for a few hours a day." They would drive in the morning, drop the kids off at school, and then go home to do chores. At the end of the school day, they would drop the kids off at their homes; Gene would end his route around 4:00PM and Janice around 4:30PM.

In the next chapter in their life, Gene plans on living longer and deer hunting. For Janice, she was only retired for a month before getting back in the bus driver's seat. Their son, Joe, took over the bus business on January 1st and needed a driver, naturally turning to his mom. Though, she does love being outside and plans on continuing gardening, she is happy to help out and be back on the bus with the kids. "We just love the kids; they keep us young". Along with that, they plan on continuing bowling together, which they've been doing since they were married.

With the third generation of the Fielding's taking over, Gene and Janice had this advice to give him (jokingly), "good luck". Gene's not too worried though, "He (Joe) knows what it's about". When asked if driving the same route for 51 years ever got old, Gene said, "I don't think so. "I've driven my whole life, I really enjoy driving". Reflecting on the 18,000 plus daily trips, Gene and Janice noted, "The routes are the same, but the kids are different (each year). It's really cool being able to see them grow up. It's a pleasure to see the little kids come out of the school every day." At the end of the day, they both agreed, "it's the kids; they're just awesome".

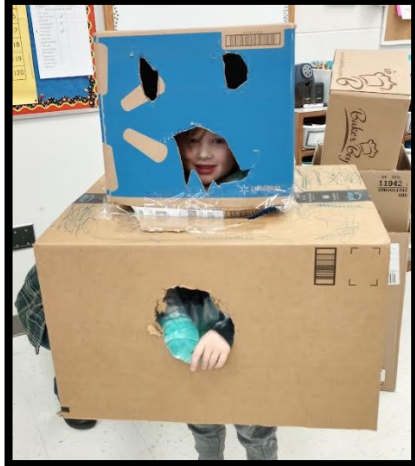

FOURTH GRADE

Another school year is halfway complete and fourth grade has been keeping busy! Students have written persuasive essays and historical fiction stories, learned strategies for mixed operation story problems, and have practiced reading skills like analyzing a character's perspective and backing up their thinking with text evidence. Many students also challenged themselves by participating in both the school spelling bee and the Noetic math competition.



In science, fourth graders are learning all about energy, and have been doing experiments with circuits, batteries, light bulbs, motors, wires and switches. They have also learned about the environment, and even adopted "pet" mealworms to study. The students are learning methods of scientific observation to keep track of their mealworms growth and life cycle.

In social studies, students have been learning all about Wisconsin's journey to statehood, including the writing of our constitution and immigration from European countries in the 1800s. Students have learned about the culture of these past immigrants that is still present today.

Fourth graders have also made lots of time for fun! Students have participated in many school dress up days and in Global Day of Play, as well as sang and played recorders in the winter concert. We are now looking forward to two upcoming field trips to the Weidner Center and to Madison, WI to see the state capitol building and visit the Henry Vilas Zoo.



FIFTH GRADE

February and March have been productive times in 5th grade. In ELA, students finished their westward expansion reports. They go the chance to try an 1800's cracker called hardtack. They also wrote definition essays about that patriotism means to them. Our young mathematicians have been sharpening their division skills while putting all they have learned toward working with equations.

In science, students have been learning about mixtures and solutions. Students have created mixtures, learned about their properties, and then dissected the meaning of "dissolve or melt". Next up, students will create their own flavored drinks while learning about the properties of solubility and saturation. Students have also been developing their observation, teamwork, and communication skills during their experiments.

Lastly, it wouldn't be 5th grade without some fun. The grade had a fantastic winter hike at the Navarino Nature Center. Getting the chance to combine an outdoor exercise activity with lessons about forest ecology was awesome. The kids learned a lot and had a blast as well. It is always great to get out and enjoy our Wisconsin winters!

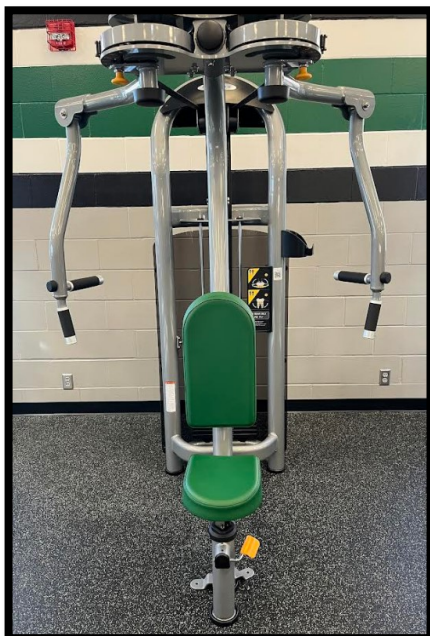
