





Spring Noetic Math Contest Results

On April 5, ninety-three students (10 more students than the Fall group) in Grades 3-6 participated in the Spring Noetic Math Contest. Third and Fifth grade had two tied team winners with scores of 70%. That means they correctly answered 14 out of 20 questions. Ninety is the percentage to beat in our school, hopefully next year! The highest grade level team achievement score was Grade 3 with 370 points, with Grade 5 coming in 5 points less at 365. 
cussing with Mrs. Cornell, Mrs. Zeinert, and Mrs. Suda, everyone agreed that it was a great idea.


