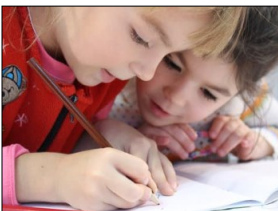

May is "Busy Business" time in Grade 2

April showers bring May flowers! It is hard to believe it's the month of May already! This school year seemed to fly by! Even though the end of the year is fast approaching, we still have a lot of learning to do! Let's finish the year strong!

Busy Business Day is a social studies unit that focuses on economics. It is



a wonderful opportunity for students to learn how to be consumers and producers in a market setting. In this unit, second graders will learn the difference between products and services, and participate in an authentic learning experience as producers and consumers. The students will act as

consumers by spending the "Market Madness" money they have earned. They will also act as producers and open a store to earn more play money. Before the big day they will need to think of ways to advertise their product/service, decide on the cost of their product/service and make sure they have all the necessary supplies to run their store. Then each student will get to sell their products/services to their peers! Watch for pictures from the day as we will share soon after.

Students will continue to work on their reading and math skills up to the end of the school year so please remind them to read each night and check for homework. Thanks for all you do to support your students in their successes.

Almost There.... Nearing Phase II Goal



The community came together in a huge way when it came to the need for a new playground. In February 2024, after the failed referendum, we knew that the need for a safe play and learning environment did not go away. After further inspection of the 1996 playground equipment, we knew our students needed a new playground, and it could not wait. This past fall, we were able to install a full play system in the place where the old system sat. Since that install, our eager students were able to enjoy a safe and suitable play space. The students are able to climb high, ride the roller coaster, and go across the money bars with a lot of laughter and teamwork.

We knew there was more opportunity to grow the play space with the room that we had available. Knowing we had to give students of all abilities a chance to spread out

and play in a space that they can enjoy, there was a joint effort to continue the mission to fundraise for the additional equipment.

We can proudly say that our current playground fund has a balance of \$83,397. Those funds were all raised through the community, raffles, grants, and donations. We can not thank this community enough for the huge support in the project. With the money that we have currently raised we will be purchasing and installing extra play pieces like a climber, new swings, an ADA spinner, three stations of musical instruments, an ADA picnic table, benches, and a sunshade. The goal would be to have these items installed and ready for play by the fall when students return from summer break.



A lot of learning left in final quarter of Fourth Grade

It’s hard to believe we’re already in the final quarter of the school year! The fourth graders have completed all of their Forward testing! They worked incredibly hard and gave their best effort.



In math, the fourth graders have been working on understanding decimals and fractions, and exploring how these two concepts are related. As the school year comes to a close, students will shift their focus to geometry, where they will explore shapes, angles, and other geometric concepts.

Fourth graders can also be found working hard in reading and writing! They are focusing on literature and using text evidence to support their analysis of characters, themes, and key ideas. For reading, our novel study of *The Tiger Rising* is helping students practice these skills. In writing, fourth graders are completing literary essays, where they are working to prove their claims regarding a character’s change, traits, or themes using text evidence to back up their thoughts and analysis. In science, the fourth graders are exploring volcanoes,



weathering, and energy transfer. For social studies, they will be learning about state and local governments, with a chance to experience this firsthand during our field trip to Madison on May 21, 2025.

Even though the fourth graders have been working hard we have still had fun! Students have completed fun activities with their buddy classes, had a celebration after Forward testing, and have had outdoor brain breaks! We look forward to a strong finish to the school year!

Nonstop learning in First Grade

Here in first grade, we have been enjoying the signs of spring with the warm days we have been having. We have been able to do some Science learning outside exploring with our shadows and day and night patterns! We have been exploring various opinions as we read and write about them. Just a reminder to please keep up that nightly routine of reading with your child. It’s one of the most important stepping stones to a successful school year. Also remember to check Seesaw for important messages and work that has been added to your child’s journal.



In math this last quarter, we’ll be concentrating on the following units: time, fractions, 2D and 3D shapes, measurement, and solving addition and subtraction facts where there is an unknown partner ($13 + __ = 18$). Here are a few ideas to help your child connect

math to the real world: **Time**—Telling time to the hour and half hour on both analog and digital clocks. **Fractions**—when making/cutting sandwiches or fruit, etc. ask your child to cut the food in half or fourths. Give your child 8 slices of an apple. Ask him/her to divide the slices in half (2 groups), or give you a fourth of the slices (2 slices). **Shapes**—play “I Spy” with common objects around the room. For example, say “I spy a circle” (clock), “I spy a cylinder” (can of soup), “I spy a rectangular prism” (shoe box). **Unknown Partner Equations**—present everyday type problems: when shopping, tell your child you need 9 cans of soup, but you already have 4 cans at home, so how many should you buy right now? When cutting fruit, tell your child you had 10 slices of an apple, but now there are only 3, so how many did I eat? By involving your child in these everyday type situations, he/she will see how important math is in our lives and how we use it in the real world. It’s hard to believe that we’re into our 4th quarter already. The students have come a long way. We’re so proud of them! Give your child a hug and express how you feel, too.

Welcome to the Counselor's Corner. We felt that providing a single location for our information would be more useful and convenient to all of our students and their families. Our counseling program offers services of individual counseling, group counseling, or outside referrals. Please feel free to contact us at any time regarding academic, emotional, or social needs of your child.

We are wrapping up this school year by continuing to focus on calming down strategies. These are tools the children can utilize when they are having a strong feeling (anxious, mad, worried, scared, frustrated, etc). We will then end with a review of all skills/tools we have been practicing throughout the school year.

5th Grade Students will head to JA "BizTown" on May 8, 2025 where they will have a day long simulation as citizens in a town. They will be assigned a job, learn about managing money, voting and more!

Students in Grades 5 and 6 will continue to discuss future plans. Fifth grade students will be heading to Grade 6 on May 16 (tentatively) to get a glimpse of what they can look forward to next school year. They will meet the teachers, take a tour of the new space, practice locker combinations, and discuss class and organization.

Grade 6 students are continuing to work on their Academic Career Plan in Xello. Sixth grade students will be meet with Mrs. Cornell, the MS/HS Counselor and look at sample schedules they can expect to see in seventh grade.

High School students should view their 2025-2026 schedules in Skyward. Make an appointment with Mrs. Cornell before summer break if any schedule changes are needed.

High School Spanish Club Students explored Costa Rica

Twenty five of our high school students took an unforgettable journey to Costa Rica, diving into culture, history, and adventure!

Day one kicked off with a coffee tour, where they learned about and taste-tested world-famous Costa Rican coffee and bananas. They were lucky enough to catch a parade honoring the Battle of Rivas, soaking in the vibrant culture.



They ended the first day with a super fun Latin dance lesson which was a blast!

Day two brought the group to the Arenal Volcano region, with a stop at Costa Rica's largest oxcart to learn its colorful history. Then came a thrilling zipline experience high above the lush forest canopy, followed by a relaxing dip at the Baldi Hot Springs—the largest in the world! The adventure continued with a cruise on the Sarapiquí River, spotting wildlife like howler monkeys, bats, exotic birds, and even a crocodile! Then it was off to the Tirimbina Rainforest Reserve, where students crossed a suspension bridge, spotted a sloth, and had a hands-on chocolate-making experience—complete with history, learning, and (of course) tasting!

The next day of their Costa Rica trip was a very special experience. Their group prepared meals for around 70 local children who did not have access to their normal school meals due to a school break for the Easter holiday. First, students shopped for supplies at a local su-

permarket (a fun experience in itself!) to provide sandwiches, fresh fruit, drinks, cookies, and a frozen treat. After making and serving the food, there was a lot of fun interaction.



Students talked and played with the Costa Rican children, many of whom did not speak any English and had never before met an American. The children warmed up quickly to our group and soon there were games like Duck, Duck, Goose (or Pato, Pato, Gonso in Spanish!) and dances. It was a heartwarming and meaningful day showing students the power of interaction and connection!

The last two days of the trip took them to the Pacific Coast. Students enjoyed the Punta Leona area by visiting both a resort and ocean beach. Lots of swimming, volleyball, and sun were enjoyed! For several students, it was their first experience at the ocean! Their coastal visit included a visit to Costa Rica's Manuel Antonio National Park. They hiked through the park, saw a sloth, deer, iguanas, monkeys, lots of beautiful forest, and more pristine beaches! It was two beautiful days of enjoying Costa Rica's beautiful natural landscape. What an amazing experience for the Spanish Club students.





It's an exciting time for our students as the school year comes to an end. In April, the 3rd and 6th graders enjoyed an Ice Cream Sundae party for winning the Elementary and Middle School competitions of the Penny War. 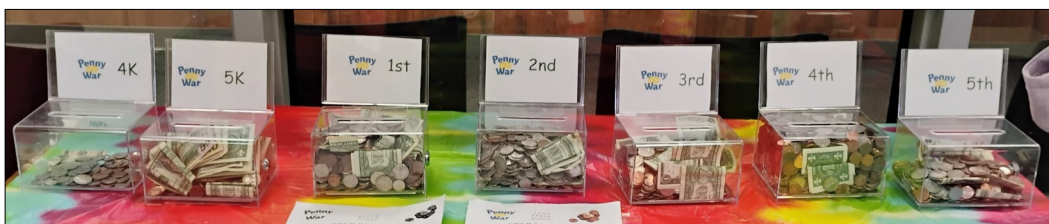
