Must attend to sign up students 4K - age 11 for After-School Child Care to begin in September

After School Child Care Sign-up is May 3

hree informational meetings were held during the month of April to help parents become familiar with the Boys and Girls Club (BGC) of the Fox Valley's after-school child care program. Badger Elementary Site Director, Lynn Hawkins, discussed the programming offered, student-to-staff ratios, and general costs of the program that would be available after school to students 4K - Age 11.

At least 30 paid contracts are needed for the program to run beginning in September. Three BGC staff members would serve the students enrolled. Because of regulations, BGC can only contract for payment with parents of students Ages 7 - 11. Students in 4K -Age 6 are welcome to sign up, but cannot be formally charged. In these instances, we are asking parents to donate the equivalent of the contract cost to help defray expenses related to caring for their 4K - Age 6 student.

Next Steps

A mandatory sign-up is scheduled for May 3 from 6:30-8:30 p.m. in the LMC. The number of students signed up during this meeting will determine whether the After-school Child Care program is able to start in September or not.

Survey Opens Regarding On-site Child Care Center

ontinuing with their efforts to assess the current and on-site child care center, the District crafted an on-line survey and is asking parents to participate.

According to Mrs. Schweitzer, District Administrator, "The survey results will be used to determine if there is a need and/or interest for additional child care services in the community for children birth to 4K/5K age. Once these results are known, we will bring together the current child care providers to discuss what availability exists for their in-home sites. Ultimately, it's a matter of supply and demand - is the supply of child care offerings now and in the future sufficient to meet the demands as shown through the survey."

TAKE THE SURVEY

Parents of children birth to 4K/5K and those expecting within the next two years are encouraged to take the survey, which can be accessed at http://shiocton.donovangroup.com/. The survey will be available from April 18 through May 8. Mrs. Schweitzer noted that "only one parent from each household should take the survey so as to most accurately estimate child care needs." Parents without Internet access at home are encouraged to visit the public library or the school to complete the survey.

The Review Committee is comprised of Bob Brownson, Jack Tackman, Larry Van Straten, Pete Warning, Dave Gomm, Brad Ritchie, and myself. Three area firms - Hoffman, Keller, and Miron - submitted proposals which were reviewed and discussed during meetings held on April 12 and 18. The committee chose to interview and receive presentations by Miron, Hoffman, and Keller during the week of May 1. A recommendation to hire will go before the Board in May.

Next Steps

Proposals submitted required the construction business to also have a partnering architectural firm, if the company did not already have one within house. Once a firm is hired, the company and its architects will begin working with the District to determine the needs the facility is designed to meet. School and community members will be asked to share their ideas and suggestions along the way as the firm crafts renderings of multiple options with estimated costs.

Looking Ahead

By late fall, we will have a more definitive facility plan and a better estimate of related costs. We will also know how much fundraising is needed and what amount of the overall cost would need to go to a community vote. The School Board would need to take formal action to go to referendum. This could take place as early as December.

A Step Back in Time....

.S. History students recently learned about WWII and the Vietnam War from those who served in it. WWII veteran Arnold "Bud" Stem, of New London, spoke about his service as a nurse and surgical assistant in Europe and of his experiences at the liberation of camp Mathausen-Gusen and the cleanup at Dachau.

Vietnam War veterans Bob Dieck and Bill Blom of Shiocton and Lee Piechocki, formerly of Shiocton, also shared the stories of their service as the students are currently studying the Vietnam War in class. Dieck, a cook, and Blom, an infantryman assigned to a flamethrower, served in the southern regions of South Vietnam, areas comprised largely of rice paddies. Piechocki, an infantryman and eventually an aircraft controller, served in the northern area of the country, a more mountainous region with areas of dense vegetation.

Students have a better understanding of these wars and the struggles of those who fought in them thanks to the willingness of our local veterans to share their stories. Students always enjoy guest speakers, and we are so lucky to have veterans in our community who are able to help young people understand history and to appreciate those who served our country."





Math Expressions

hat if you tried to put your shoes on before your socks? Or your jacket before your shirt?



Although these tasks may work, the outcome is just not the same. 5th grade students have been learning the importance of the Order of Operations in mathematical equations. Even though the same numbers and operations are used, if done in a different order, they will produce two different answers.

Order of Operations is just one of the many topics in our Math Expressions curriculum. Many of you are now familiar with Math Expressions, and the 'Math Talk' environment it develops. It is true! In 5th grade we begin each lesson with a quick practice routine that is student driven. We then go over our lesson. The lesson is often reinforced with partner or small group work. Students work at explaining their thinking to help deepen their partner's understanding. Small groups will present their explanation and solution to their class. If the class agrees, we give a thumbs up. If we have questions, or are aware of an error, we put up a 'helping hand.'

This environment for math is very effective in engaging all students in Math Talk. Whether they present to the class, are working on their math board, or are discussing the material, all students are engaged. Great things are happening every day in 5th grade!



Thanks to a plethora of community support, Books on the Bus was kicked off on Thursday, March 30, 2017, on Jen Calabrese's Bus 4. The students also and was a thrilled to be a back in the standard of the sta



How did this come about? Initially, this idea was brought forth by Jill Krohlow at the end of 2016. In 2017, after being inspired by Southern Door's and Seymour's Programs, Shari Griesbach attended a meeting with our bus drivers to determine interest in piloting the program here in Shiocton. Four bus drivers stepped up as willing participants!

What was next? SPICE volunteered to cover the start up costs to purchase eight seat covers from Debra Rhoades of Brillion to pilot two buses while we worked with community members to plan out how to sew more seat covers locally and more cost effectively. With some additional dollars from the District, Debra Rhoades was able to create 12 seat covers so that we could get the program up and running.

Missy Bousley, Reading Specialist at Southern Door and a cousin to Mrs. Griesbach, donated three boxes of new Little Golden Books to stuff the bus.

Missy, along with Southern Door bus driver, Ted Chaudoir, began the Books on the Bus program years prior and have been sharing tips and tricks to a successful program throughout the state.

Half Price Books donated boxes of books to the program as did the local Shiocton Public Library. With news spreading on social media, parents have also been dropping off gently used children's books (picture books primarily for students 4K-3rd grade).

Rita Olson wrote a \$250 grant through Thrivent Financial; these dollars will be put towards the purchase of material to build more seat covers. Jeanne Olson, grandparent of a few Shiocton elementary students and former parent and SPICE member, has been donating her time to craft seat covers to be more cost effective. Additionally, Robin Wilson, owner of Wilson Upholstery in New London, has also been working with the program to look into sewing the seat covers in a more cost effective manner.

Many folks within the school have also given of their time, including Sue Cismoski, paraprofessional, who helped with sorting the books, getting them organized, and onto the buses! Stef Van Asten's bus also joined the Books on the Bus pilot on April 6. Stef is a SPICE member, parent, and bus driver, so she is excited at the opportunities this program offers.

We are still raising funds to make more seat covers and accepting gently used books or new picture books. Donations are always welcome! Our hope is to have Books on the Bus up and "rolling" on more routes come fall.

Health Office: Bike Safety

Kids are sometimes reluctant to wear helmets. They may insist they're good riders who don't need helmets anymore but we urge you to resist that temptation. Requiring your children to wear a helmet every time is the best thing you can do to protect them.

Helmet tips:

- **Don't negotiate.** It's estimated that 75 percent of bicycle-related deaths among children could be prevented with a bicycle helmet.
- **Buy a helmet** that meets or exceeds current safety standards developed by the <u>U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission</u>.
- Correct fit is essential. Do the "Eyes, Ears and Mouth" check:
 - 1. EYES check: Position the helmet on your head. Look up and you should see the bottom rim of the helmet (one to two fingers above the eyebrows).
 - 2. EARS check: Make sure the straps of the helmet form a "V" under your ears when buckled. The strap should be snug but comfortable.
 - 3. MOUTH check: Now open your mouth as wide as you can! Do you feel the helmet hug your head? If not, tighten those straps!
- If your child is reluctant to wear a helmet, try letting them choose their own. Helmets come in many colors and styles allowing children to choose a helmet that's "cool" may make them want to wear it.
- Talk to other parents and encourage them to have their kids wear helmets. Let your children see that you wear a helmet, too.

Practice bike safety:

Cyclists should be restricted to sidewalks and paths until they reach the age of 10. Supervision is essential until children develop the necessary traffic skills and judgment and know the rules of the road.

Teach your children:

A bicycle is a vehicle, not a toy. Riding a bike – especially around traffic – is an important responsibility.

- Ride with traffic, not against it. Ride as far to the right as possible.
- Use appropriate hand signals.
- Respect traffic signals. Stop at all stop signs and red lights.
- Stop and look left, right and left again before entering a street.
- Look back and yield to traffic coming from behind before turning left at intersections.
- Don't ride when it's dark. If riding in the evening is unavoidable, wear reflective material on clothing and have reflectors and lights on the bike.

Finally, proper bike fit and maintenance can help prevent injuries. Your child's feet should reach the ground while sitting on the bike seat. Make sure the reflectors are secure, brakes work properly, gears shift smoothly, and tires are tightly secured and properly inflated.
