## 4K Program: <br> Survey Results, Next Steps <br> By Mrs. Schweitzer

In early April, a survey was shared with parents of past, present, and future 4 K students seeking information regarding the format of the 4 K program. Currently, our 4 K program offers part-time instruction two (2) full days each week: M/W or T/Th. Over the past few years, however, a few concerns have arisen regarding this format, including the significant time span between dates of attendance when absences and planned days off interrupt students' regular attendance. In keeping, the survey gathered parents' thoughts on attending four half-days, Mon - Thurs AMs or PMs; parents shared their thoughts on the benefits and challenges of such a program format. Of the 33 persons responding, 18 of them will have children attending 4 K next year. Of these 18 respondents, nine (9) indicated that they would prefer the four half-days options and an equal number indicated that they would prefer the format to remain as two full-days per week. Overwhelmingly, respondents indicated that child care opposite of their child's time in the 4 K classroom was a significant need and challenge for their family.

## Next Steps

Given the feedback from parents, we will continue to research options both for instruction, as well as for child care. With so
many respondents indicating that they would likely need to enroll their child in Shiocton Child Care Center, we need to explore the capacity of SCCC to provide space and staffing for what could amount to an additional 30 children each day. Too, we need to examine additional formats utilized by other school districts, which include full-day 4 K for four or five days each week.

A more definitive plan will be drafted by the time 4 K and 5 K Parent Orientation takes place in late May. Thank you again to all who provided this valuable feedback.

## FOURTH GRADE

Fourth graders spent Quarter 3 working hard! In math, students converted measurements in both customary and metric units. Students also added, subtracted, and multiplied both fractions and mixed numbers. In writing and reading, 4th graders became researchers and informational writers. They studied subtopics of the American Revolution and became experts on events and people such as the Boston Tea Party, the Declaration of Independence, and Abigail Adams.

Next, they switched gears to learn about figurative language, comparing elements of poetry, drama, and prose. In environmental studies, students conducted experiments to discover ideal growing conditions for different crops. In energy studies, students explored potential and kinetic energy to learn how things move. In social studies, students learned about Wisconsin's role in the Civil War and in the Industrial Revolution. In May, students are looking forward to taking our annual field trip to the State Capitol where they will tour the building and learn about state government.

Students did their best on the Wisconsin Forward Exam this quarter while also enjoying some fun during Global School Day of Play, World Read Aloud Day, and the many spirit dress up days. We are excited about a strong finish to the year!

## FIFTH GRADE

What do 5th graders have a lot of? Opinions! Students are finishing up their research-based Argument and Opinion writing unit. They have authored written opinions using information gained through various means of research. A popular one again this year was whether chocolate milk should continue to
 be served. The answer: overwhelmingly "yes". Students also participated in in-class debates and wrote free-choice opinion essay. We will finish the year with a study of poetry before writing our end-of-year memoir. The writing instruction dovetails with that in reading, as our 5th graders have learned about historical fiction, poetry, and social issue realistic fiction. Between reading and writing, we have had great discussions in class and during our book clubs.

Math instruction is progressing from our study of fractions to that of the everimportant units of measurement and geometry. Students are enjoying learning how to accurately measure the world around them. They are also learning how to take math and apply it to real world situations using geometry.

Science students are learning about the meaning of the phrase "the solution to a problem is often dilution". Mixtures, solutions, solubility and saturation are all topics of discussion for our 5th grade scientists. The skills of observation and note taking are big parts of this end of the year unit.

Together, we are finishing strong in 5th grade!

## CogAT (Cognitive Abilities Test) Screening

Mrs. Otto's, Miss Schmidt's and Mrs. Sippel's second grade classes participated in the CogAT Screening. This screener is used by the Gifted and Talented program to guide selection for the Gifted and Talented Academic Program. Approximately 10 percent of the screened students go on for further CogAT testing. Their scores are factored into the selection process with many other considerations and data including parental advocacy and nominations from parents and teachers.

## Shiocton's Lana Arneson Earns Berth at State Spelling Bee

The Badger State Spelling Bee began in 1949. The champion advances to the Scripps National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C., expenses paid by the Wisconsin State Journal. All 55 contestants received a statewide t-short and two copies of the March 24th edition of the Wisconsin State Journal with a full page featuring the Badger State Spelling Bee participants. The top three spellers earn $\$ 200$, $\$ 300$ and the winner $\$ 500$, plus the top two received beautiful trophies. Their pronouncer was Barry William, LaCrosse-area radio journalist who once sat in this bee himself as a student.

Lana Arneson represented the Shiocton Middle School. The word 'parenthetic' in round two gave her a bit of a challenge when she added an additional ' $r$ ', but resilient Lana was a show stopper when, as we were leaving at the end of the bee, she spelled the word 'supercalifragilisticexpialidocious', a word with 14 syllables, 16 vowels and 18 consonants, a total of 34 letters! With spelling skills like this, watch out Badger State! Lana may well be among the competitors again next year with more confidence and expertise!

We had engaging conversation before and after each time we met. The support of the government for the limited time of eight months was alarming. We saw how many challenges arise as well, reallife challenges we hadn't really thought about. For example, some challenges were types of foods preferred, frustrations with abiding by the government expectations, and all without knowing any of the language. Cultural challenges are great as well. Our group wished we knew how things turned out for these families. We were invested in learning more after seeing and discussing the documentary."

## Vaccination reminder for families of 5th graders:

All students are required to receive a Tdap vaccination upon entrance into 6th grade. Please make arrangements for your child to receive this vaccination prior to the start of next school year. Community healthcare providers are typically very busy in the weeks leading to the start of fall classes, so you are encouraged to have your child immunized well in advance of school beginning. If your child has already received the Tdap, please provide a copy of the updated shot record to the school office or call Nurse Amy to update your records.
If you do not wish to have your child immunized, you are required to sign a waiver. The waiver option is located on the bottom half of the immunization form. These forms are available from the District website. If you already completed a waiver for your child in Kindergarten, you will need to complete a new waiver as this immunization is a new requirement.

## PAHLOW MASONRY BRINGS HANDS-ON BACK TO SHIOCTON

In March, Pahlow Masonry made a return to the tech ed classroom to work side -by-side the students for a hands-on learning experience. For a full week, Pahlow Masonry provided multiple crew members who shared information about their craft - preparing, demonstrating, guiding, mentoring, and supporting the students in the Building Trades classes in project-based learning experiences. Over the period of five days, the students were able to learn about becoming a mason and the skills needed to be successful in the trade. Working shoulder-to-shoulder with the crew from Pahlow, students were able to understand mixing mortar, tending masons, and laying cement block and brick, as well as the technical and communication skills needed to be successful in the building trades.

In addition to the hands-on experiences, Doug and Brock Pahlow spent a day walking students through the estimating and bidding process, giving them a glimpse into the financial and logistical aspects of a project, as well as the relationship that happens before the jobsite starts.. Through this process, students became aware of the necessary reading, writing, and math skills needed to advance in the construction careers and into leadership roles. This was a unique side of business management that many students have never experienced before. Project management and planning is a key component that was rolled out to the students in a way that helps them to understand what it takes to move into leadership roles.

Learning about the critical thinking, planning, and practical skills necessary was an experience that cannot be authentically created in a classroom setting without the direct support of businesses like Pahlow. This year materials have been expensive and finding new ways to bring businesses back into the classroom has been long awaited by students. Taking a look at the greater Shiocton area, there are a large number of families that are thriving thanks to careers in the construction industry and throughout the skilled trades workforce. We would like to give a big thank you to Doug and everyone at Pahlow Masonry who went above and beyond to work with the students in Shiocton for this experience. This was one example of a great opportunity that would not have happened without the generous support of our community businesses.
