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## COVID-19 Positive Cases on the Rise

Over the past two weeks, the District has seen a significant rise in the number of COVID-19 positive cases, especially among our high school students.

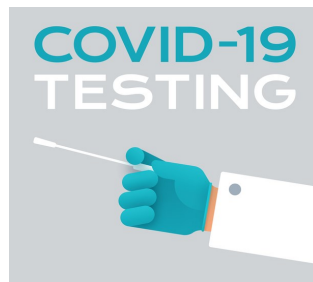
“The good news is that we are testing more and more students, siblings, and parents. It makes sense that increased testing would lead to increased positive numbers,” stated Mrs. Schweitzer. “The concern I have is that the symptoms are so mild, it is easy to see why parents think their child has the common cold. Same with adults in the school.”

Mrs. Schweitzer noted that the District reached a critical point on Monday, October 18, regarding ill teachers. “We were one teacher absence away from having to go virtual. Even with staff and administrators subbing in, the number of absences stretched us to capacity.” Parents and students are encouraged to remember that the Delta variant spreads more rapidly and widely than the virus from last year did, which means more people are able to be infected by just one person.

## Free COVID-19 Testing: When and Where

The District is offering free COVID-19 antigen testing Monday through Friday:

- **Who:** all students\*, siblings living in the household, parents, and caregivers; staff and family members living in the household. NOTE: A parent/guardian must be present to register the student/siblings if s/he is under the age of 18
- **When:** 8:15AM - 1:30PM
- **Where:** Senior Lounge (Entrance 3E) (park in the HS parking lot, behind the school building)
- **What:** Rapid antigen test (results in 15 minutes) OR PCR test (results in 1-2 days)



### To Register:

Before testing can begin, parents and those over age 18 will need to register at <https://register.covidconnect.wi.gov/en-US/>

- A smart device, such as a touch screen cell phone, will be needed to register; devices not provided.
- Parent or those over 18 will need a copy of the email with the QR code (either phone or paper is fine) that is sent to after registration is complete.
- Each person being tested needs to be registered

## CHIEF CHATTER

### Technical Education: Donations Today, Growth on the Horizon

“It’s not your father’s Oldsmobile”, was a phrase used by so many people to refer to so many situations. Many of which had nothing at all to do with cars but the saying fit because the change experienced was so dramatically different. Such is the case with Technical Education .

Commonly referred to as “Tech Ed”, this area of study revolved around metals, welding, and woodworking when many of us had the opportunity to take these courses in high school. Some schools were fortunate enough to have an automotive class and some had drafting. None in my day had Computer Aided Drafting (CAD), and we certainly didn’t have the opportunity to build a prototype on computer software and then have it printed in 3D filament.

The Tech Ed programs of today incorporate so many more electronic and computer-aided tools. More and more of our Tech Ed equipment is operated by increasingly sophisticated computer programs much more so than by hand. Take for instance the new CNC Plasma Cutter that will soon grace the floor of our welding classroom. The addition of this machine means both growth for the projects that our students are able to create but also growth in their knowledge of an industry-grade computerized machine and the development of skills desired by so many employers in the trade fields.

This is but one example of where we hope to grow our Technical Education program in the coming years. As we look to the horizon, we see endless possibilities for our students in the trades, and we want to be the catalyst for the growth in trade-ready professionals. To do this will take time and it will take resources. Human, physical, and financial resources. Some of these resources have already been provided through the generous donations of community members for the purchase of the plasma cutter. More of these resources will be needed in the future. All of these resources will be solid investments in our children’s education, in our community’s future.

Change is inevitable and sometimes dramatically different. Dad’s Oldsmobile isn’t in our driveway anymore. Eventually, the same will come to pass with our trades equipment. After all, “it’s not our father’s shop class” anymore.

Our math dry erase boards are getting a lot of use lately making proof drawings to help the students show and explain their thinking to partners.

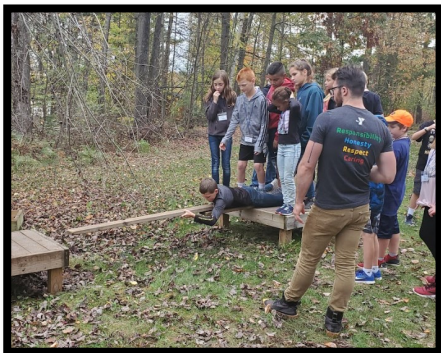
## 5TH GRADE

## DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

### National Hispanic Heritage Month: September 15-October 15

Each year, Americans observe National Hispanic Heritage Month from September 15—October 15 by celebrating the histories, cultures, and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Central and South America.

The observation started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting on September 15 and ending on October 15. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988, on the approval of Public Law 100-402.

The day of September 15 is significant because it is the anniversary of independence for Latin American countries Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September 16 and September 18, respectfully. Also, Columbus Day or Dia de la Raza, which is October 12, falls within this 30 day period.

- \* can point to at least four colors
- \* catch a large ball tossed to them
- \* know full name, age and gender
- \* cut paper with a scissors
- \* jump forward or over an object
- \* draw a circle
