



### Annual Meeting: Growth Continues

In February of 2018, voters approved a three-year, \$3 million dollar non-recurring operational referendum. At the same time, voters approved a \$2 million dollar building referendum for the purpose of constructing a multi-purpose facility. Together, the anticipated mill rates of \$9.33, \$9.75, and \$9.78 were approved on a three-to-one yes vote.

#### TWO YEARS LATER

Last year, we presented a budget that would likely require the use of \$485,000 from the fund balance. This was in part due to a continued reduction in funding from the state and federal levels, as well as increases in instructional and operational expenditures. In March, 2020, the coronavirus pandemic surged, causing the State to shut down school buildings and students to learn via digital and virtual means. Budgeted dollars had to be reallocated as we sought to provide students and teachers with needed technology and support as we transitioned from in-person to digital instruction. Too, we reallocated dollars so as to provide internet access devices to those in need, as well as over 750 meals (breakfast and lunch) each day to students; these meals were prepared and packaged by our food service and paraprofessional staff members and then delivered by bus. Our custodial staff kept the building sanitized and clean for those of us working within, including teachers with the Shiocton Child Care Center, who resumed care services on April 27, 2020. In all, we were able to maintain full employment of our staff members in meaningful ways that still served the needs of our learners. As the saying goes, “learning together though we’re apart”. Even with all of the budget adjustments, we were able to eliminate our deficit, adding close to \$300,000 back to the Fund Balance.

As we look ahead to the 2020-2021 school year, our final referendum year, we are facing another deficit budget, this time of nearly \$825,000 at a mill rate of approximately \$9.60. However, many contributing factors that will impact the final budget and final level amount are as yet unknown. The student population count will not be certified until September 25; we do anticipate a decrease in Open Enrollment out numbers, which would in turn decrease the amount of money budgeted for this expenditure. General aid

funds from the State will not be certified until October 15. The District’s property valuation figures will not be released until early October. The number of students granted private school waiver dollars will not be finalized until mid-October. These are just a few of the key factors that are yet to be decided as we present the budget for the community’s review on September 28, 2020.

#### BALANCING ACT - INCREASED EXPENDITURES and GROWING PROGRAMS

Despite the anticipated deficit, I am pleased to report that we are managing to meet the changing needs of our students and meet the concerns for health and safety of staff and students. Many of our expenditures have increased this year as we have added plexi-glass partitions and communication dividers to classrooms and offices. The purchasing of disposable face coverings, hand sanitizer solution, and sanitizer stations have also increased the amount of dollars needing to be allocated for general supplies. In anticipation of a growth in staff absences, we hired a full-time substitute teacher. The cost of keeping students and staff as safe and healthy as possible while providing face-to-face instruction has certainly impacted this year’s budget.

Where there is change, there is growth, and we have certainly grown from the changes required as we work to educate the youth of our community during the continued pandemic environment. These are good changes; these are changes that are serving to grow our programs and our skills. As a result of the parent survey results from last July, we were able to partner with a third-party vendor to provide a full-time virtual instructional program to our students in Grades K-12. Too, teachers continue to grow their technical knowledge and hone their instructional skills when using digital means to incorporate students learning from home during quarantine or other short-term absences. But COVID-19 isn’t the only catalyst for change this year. Seeing and hearing what students were voicing through the ACP data and chats with teachers, the District responded by partnering with Mi-

We appreciate the trust and confidence you con-

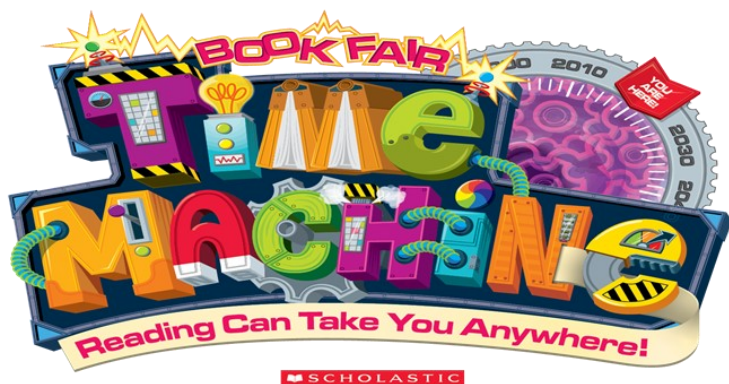

And the teachers are so incredibly happy to be able to teach your kids.

The students also doing a wonderful job at wearing their masks! All of us at the school want to thank you as parents for offering positive encouragement for them to continue wearing them for as long as we are required to do so. I am happy to discuss your child's symptoms with you so that we can develop a plan to get them back to school as soon as we are able while keeping the rest of the class as healthy and safe as possible.

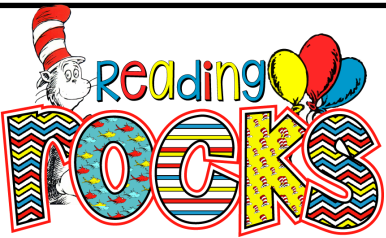

Fall Sports Event Guidelines:

These guidelines are put in place to keep our athletes, coaches, officials, game workers and fans safe.

Football:

- Fans will not be limited at Football games. We **highly recommend all spectators to be masked at our events, as well as maintain social distancing of a minimum of 6 feet between non-household spectators. We appreciate your willingness to adhere to these precautions for the safety of our players, coaches, and officials.**
- Press Box
  - Masks are required
  - Announcer
  - Scoreboard Operator
  - Radio/Media if space allows
  - Coaches - maximum of two (2) inside the press box. An additional coach will be allowed if the press box has a balcony or roof to social distance.
  - One (1) camera person if applicable and space allows
  - Sanitation wipes and hand sanitizer will be provided
- Water
  - Communal water will not be available on the sideline (water trough/drinking station/hydration system, etc.). Each player should have their own water bottle labeled clearly with their name. **We should explore the concept of having one (1) person designated with gloves and a mask responsible for refilling labeled water bottles placed on a table with a large Gatorade cooler.**
- Locker/Team room
  - Locker rooms will not be provided for away teams. Teams should come dressed. Both teams should expect to stay in the end zone at halftime.
  - Teams are encouraged to go into opposite end zones and spread out before the game, at halftime, and at the end of the game. In the event there is inclement weather, the host team should find a way to get teams in the gymnasium/big indoor space at halftime.
- Restrooms
  - Restrooms will be available to use at each location. Hand sanitizer will be provided in the restroom.
- Concessions will only sell prepackaged food and water. Hand sanitizer will be provided at the concession stand.
- There will be no handshakes before or after the game between opposing teams



Volleyball:

- Each team will be allotted two (2) tickets per athlete, plus an additional two (2) tickets per paid/contracted coach. Each school will be responsible for allocating these tickets to their athletes and coaches. If there are two games in a gym, all spectators from the first game will be ushered out of the gym before the spectators of the second game can enter the gym. If you are on the spectator list for both the first and second games, you will still be asked to leave the first game and re-enter the gym for the second game.
- All team members of each Volleyball team will be able to sit in the gym and watch the games.
- We **require** all spectators to be masked at our CWC events. We highly recommend social distancing of a minimum of 6 feet between non-household spectators. *We appreciate your willingness to adhere to these precautions for the safety of our players, coaches and officials.*
- Water
  - Communal water will not be available. Each athlete should have their own water bottle labeled clearly with their name.
- Restrooms
  - Restrooms will be available to use at each location. Hand sanitizer will be provided in the restroom.
- Locker rooms will not be provided. Teams should come dressed.
- Hand sanitizer and sanitation wipes will be provided at the scorer’s table. All people working at the scorer’s table will be required to wear a mask.
- Concessions will only sell prepackaged food and water. Hand sanitizer will be provided at the concession stand.
- There will be no handshakes before or after the game between opposing teams
