ANNUAL MEETING REPORT Three-year Budgets: Best Estimation

n February 2015, voters approved a three-year, non-recurring referendum. The mill rate for the 2015 – 2016 school year was \$10.18 or 5-cents less than anticipated (\$10.23). The mill rate for the 2016 – 2017 was \$10.68 (\$1.03 less than anticipated). In 2017-2018, we were able to hold the mill rate to just \$10.65, which once again fell well below the anticipated rate of \$11.79.

In February of 2018, voters once again approved, on a three-to-one yes vote, a three-year, non-recurring referendum beginning with the current school year. Additionally, voters approved a \$2 million dollar referendum to building a multipurpose facility that will include an auxiliary gym and upgraded fitness and weight centers. This new space will be open to community members and organizations outside of the school and co-curricular use hours.

BALANCING ACT, BEST ESTIMATION

Preparing a budget is as much a balancing act as it is a best estimation of what you can possibly foresee in the future given what you know in the present. It is often challenging, at best, to predict in October what your expenses will be a year from then, let alone two and three. Too, one does their best in balancing the many populations served by the budget and resulting mill rate, such as our students, staff, and taxpayers. Crafting a three-year budget that meets the academic, co-curricular, and operational needs of our learners while taking into account our taxpayers and taxation base is not an easy puzzle to put together.

Historically we have done well in our efforts: three years of below-maximum mill rates and a fund balance that has grown by nearly \$700,000 after major projects were completed. As we worked with financial planners last October to foresee potential revenue and expenditures three years out, our feeling was that further decreases in the mill rate, including a reduction in the amount of annual referendum dollars could be sustained. Thus, the three-year, \$1 million dollars per year referendum was proposed with anticipated mill rates of \$9.33, \$9.75, and \$9.78.

USING FUND BALANCE, TOO DEEP?

Unfortunately, our best efforts peering into the proverbial crystal ball did not foresee the loss of two revenue exemptions - declining enrollment and hold harmless - totaling nearly \$185,000. Nor could we have foreseen the nearly 18% increase in insurance costs and resulting increase in HRA allocations. When coupled with the \$250,000 decrease in requested funding from the community, our 2018-2019 budget has changed considerably to the negative from what we forecast last October. So, too, has our anticipated mill rate, which we expect to be closer to \$9.95.

As a result of these significant changes, and in light of several one-time expenditures all coming due this year, our budget will require the use of more than \$600,000 from our Fund Balance. While this can be sustained for a single year, it cannot be so in the years to come. It is possible that we proposed too deep of a cut in requested support from our community last October. More will be known as we work through the first semester of this school year and on.

PRELIMINARY, CONTINUED SUPPORT

It must be stressed that the levy recommended for approval on September 17 is preliminary. The final levy will depend on revenues and allocations, as well as valuations, pupil counts, and FTE calculations. These numbers will be finalized by the State in October and a final levy set by November 1. We appreciate your understanding that there are still so many "moving pieces". Too, we appreciate your continued support of the education provided to the youth of our community right here in our community.

STAR Testing: During the month of September and into early October, students will be STAR testing. This computerized testing will enable teachers to get a baseline of each child's reading and/or math levels at the beginning of the year. Students will be assessed a few other times throughout the year to help teachers make instructional decisions in order to meet individual needs and monitor individual progress throughout the school year.

Phonological Awareness Literacy Screening (PALS): The Phonological Awareness Literacy Screening (PALS) is a research-based screening, diagnostic, and progress monitoring tool. Teachers in grades K4-2 will be using this tool to screen their students during the months of September through early November. Students within these grade levels will also take this assessment again in the spring. This is another assessment which will provide the teachers with academic information about each child.

Off to a Great Start in Second Grade

We've had a great start to our second grade year! New routines are in place and students are feeling more comfortable. Yet, we're stretching our thinking each day and taking on new challenges with a growth mindset! We can do anything we put our minds to!

This month students are taking a book home with them each night to enjoy. Our first weeks in school we spent a lot of time practicing how to pick "just right" books, as well as building stamina to read for longer periods of time. We're learning new reading strategies each day. Thanks for listening to your child read each night and encouraging them. The best way for them to become better readers is to READ, READ!



In math, we are working a lot on solving story situations this month. The students will be reading the story situation, restating it, and choosing one of several ways to solve it. Using "math talk" to explain their thinking is important to the process. Please listen to your child talk through their problem- solving steps with you as they complete their homework. It's important that they not only know how to solve a problem, but why they're solving it that way.

Our students are also working on their writing skills this month. They will be writing many narrative writing pieces, which are stories taken from their own lives. Each day students will learn a new writing tip to focus on and try in their own stories. By the end of the unit we'll not only have much more skillful writers, but also a collection of true stories from their first seven or eight years! Second graders are ready to ROCK!



Growth Mindset in Fourth Grade

We started the year off by learning about a Growth Mindset. A growth mindset is a belief that a person can learn and get better at anything, and that mistakes are just part of learning. We want our fourth graders to embrace new challenges, and view intelligence like a muscle. If you put in effort you will get smarter and stronger in that area. This mindset makes our classrooms a safe place to try new learning.

Some of our new challenges that we are putting our effort into is learning how to write realistic fiction stories about characters who have struggles and overcome them, discovering who we are as readers and challenging ourselves to read, read, read, and really solidifying our understanding of place value. We are off to a fun and exciting start!

Children's Dental Health

One of those necessary life skills every child needs to learn is brushing his or her teeth. Helping your child get into the habit of brushing twice a day for two minutes is no small feat, but a little creativity can go a long way when it comes to his or her long-term dental health.



Have 4 Minutes of Fun

Don't just set a timer and supervise — make brushing twice a day for two minutes an event! Crank up your child's favorite song and have a two-minute dance party. Videos or brushing apps may also make that time fly by. Try reading a 2-minute story using all your best voices. Whatever you do, get creative and switch things up, so brushing time is always a good time.

Start a Routine and Stick to It

You may be tempted to let your child skip brushing after a long day or during times when your normal schedule is off (like vacation), but keep at it. The more second nature brushing becomes the easier it will be to make sure your child is brushing twice a day for two minutes.

Reward Good Brushing Behavior

What motivates your child? If its stickers, make a reward chart and let him add one every time he brushes. If he's a reader, let him pick out the bedtime story. Maybe it's as simple as asking to see that healthy smile, saying "I'm so proud of you" and following up with a huge high five.

Characters Count

Who is the character your child can't get enough of? Many children's shows and books, including <u>Sesame Street</u>, have stories about brushing. Watch and read them together, so when it's time to brush you can use that character as a good example.

Make Up a Story

Haven't found a story or character to inspire your child? Make up your own. Your child just might be the only superhero who can brush away the bad guys that cause cavities.

Go Shopping

Let your child pick out his own toothbrush and toothpaste. Choosing a character toothbrush might make brushing more fun, and fluoride toothpastes come in a variety of flavors and colors.


